Holy week describes the events that happened to Jesus leading to his death and Resurrection. Maundy Thursday (17 April) is the beginning of the three day celebration of Easter. This period (the Triduum) is the summit of the Liturgical Year.

Through his arrest on Maundy Thursday (the Last Supper) and the Crucifixion on Good Friday, to Holy Saturday, the day that Christ's body lay in the tomb, then on Saturday, at sun down, with a fire, candles and light, the Church re-gathers to celebrate the final, and most grand moment of the Triduum, the Resurrection of our Lord. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

Saturday 19 April – Holy Saturday (Commemorates the 40hr vigil followers of Jesus held after His Crucifixion) Sunday 20 April – Easter Sunday (John 20:1-9 The Resurrection of Jesus, the greatest celebration in the Church year)

### <u>Lent</u>

Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. It is also a busy time in school:

All students attended a Service of the Word and Distribution of Ashes on Ash Wednesday.



Each day at 12 noon, we pray the Angelus. We call this "a moment with Jesus" interrupting our day so that we can stop the busyness of life and turn to God.

Year 7 and 8 have been walking the Stations of the Cross, one of the most simple, yet powerful, ways to prayerfully walk alongside Jesus and encounter him like never before. We try to place ourselves there, in each scene, seeing, hearing, smelling and tasting everything that is happening, contemplating what each person in the scene is thinking, feeling, hoping, fearing. This year we have used the SVP stations of the cross, that help us think about those suffering in our own communities.

Years 9-11 welcomed Fr Freddy and Fr Marek from Our Lady & St Patrick's parish for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Other year groups took part in an Examination of Conscience.





## LENT

### Feast Days during Lent

During Lent, most feast days that honour saints disappear from the calendar, and the saint might not even be mentioned at Mass. That's because most saints' feast days are what are known as optional memorials, which have a lower priority than the days of Lent.

There are a few exceptions for feasts that are celebrated at the higher liturgical rank of solemnity, such as the Solemnity of St Joseph on March 19 and the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord on March






Technically, even St Patrick's Day on March 17 is an optional memorial, though in some places (such as Ireland) it has the rank of a solemnity



St Oscar Romero, March 24, is a special Saint for Holy Family and his Feast Day was acknowledged in school.

We can think of these feast days as a little break from the austerity of Lent, a glimpse of the glory of the redemption and the enjoyment of the Communion of Saints.



### ENGLISH

### Year 9 English Trip to the Charles Dickens Museum and <u>The Royal Courts of Justice</u>

Across Thursday 6th and 13th March, 60 Year 9 children went on the English trip to the Charles Dickens Museum and the Royal Courts of Justice to support with their learning of Charles Dickens, Oliver Twist and crime and punishment in Victorian England.

In the morning, students spent time in the Charles Dickens museum, which was Dickens' London home for a short period of time. As walked up and down the five story house for what seemed like endless flights of stairs, students learnt about Dickens' own life in a blacking factory after his father was sent to Marshalsea Prison for debt, where we saw the real bars from the prison. Students also looked at some Victorian documents surrounding crime and punishment including floor plans of prisons, criminal records of starving teenagers who had been caught stealing and a shocking document that was used to calculate the drops

for hangings! Students left with a greater understanding of why Dickens wrote about the plight of the poor and the cruelty of the Victorian era. But it was not all doom and gloom because we were lucky enough to see Dickens' study and desk where he wrote many of his famous novels including Oliver Twist!

After having lunch in nearby Lincoln's Inn Fields where we were blessed with glorious sunshine with the A Side but not so blessed with heavy rain on the B Side, we moved onto our workshop at The Royal Courts of Justice. Students participated in a mock trial in a real court room based on the case of whether Jack Dawkins (The Artful Dodger) was guilty of stealing a silver snuff box or not. It was a brilliant opportunity for students to learn about the British legal system and to gain valuable insight into legal careers as they stepped into the roles of judge, jury, clerk, witnesses, barristers and solicitors. With real law students guiding them, they built compelling arguments, faced intense questioning, and debated with such passion that the judge had to call for order once or twice! 


### Year 7 English Trip to Shakespeare's Globe


#### **British Science Week**

### <u>Pi Day</u>


Pi Day is an annual opportunity to celebrate maths, talk about maths and eat pie. The Maths Department celebrated Pi Week from 10th - 14th March. The 14th March is dedicated to Pi, as it is the 3rd month and the 14th day – 3.14 being the start of the number of Pi.


Pi  $\pi$  is one of the most recognisable mathematical symbols. It is used to represent a constant (a fixed number) and is the ratio of the circumference of a circle to the diameter which has over 1 trillion digits beyond the decimal point and is approximated to 3.14.


The earliest approximations of pi were found in ancient Babylon and Egypt, where they both knew the value was greater than 3. The ancient Greek mathematician Archimedes discovered the first three digits of pi, 3.14 and in 1706, mathematician William Jones was the first to use the Greek symbol,  $\pi$  to represent the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter.


### <u>Pi week at Holy Family</u>

We held Pi Recitals where students boldly recited as many digits of pi as they could. There were many impressive results and our overall winner was Estif A with a remarkable 136 digits.















Well done to all students who took part!


### What is a Triage nurse ?

A Triage nurse is a registered nurse positioned in an emergency room; responsible for assessing patient's and determine their need for medical assistance.

 A Triage nurse is typically the first point of clinical contact for patient's visiting an emergency room

What is the difference between regular nurse and a Triage nurse?

#### SALARY INFORMATION

The average district nurse salary in the United Kingdom is £39,845 per year or £20,43 per hour. Entry level positions start at £34,628 per year while most experienced workers make up to £55,575 per year.

QUALIFICATIONS NEEDED

To be a qualified district nurse you need a degree in nursing which is a bachelors of science or bachelor of nursing. This degree takes 3 years to complete.




### **The Globe Theatre**

### **A Level Art and Photography Exam**




#### **Book Donations**




