HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Social media

SOCIAL MEDIA GU



TikTok is a global video community where users create share and discover 'funny and memorable moments' via short video clips – typically about 15 seconds long. Videos can be 'spiced up' with special effect filters, stickers, music and sound clips. Currently one of the world's most popular apps, TikTok was formerly known as Musical.ly, before it was rebranded by the Chinese company that acquired it in November 2017. If your child had previously had a Musical.ly account, all of their videos and personal settings will have automatically been moved to TikTok.















More than one third of children aged 6-17 consider social media stars' to be among their top role models. There are millions of creators on TikTok, showcasing their 'talents, moments and knowledge,' from singing to dancing to stunts and comedy skits, which receive thousands of likes and omments from around the world, quickly turning people into 'stars'. There is the danger that children may develop inrealistic expectations of how they should look and behave on the app in order to become the next 'star'. They may have relings of inadequacy and low self-esteem or become swaved lings of inadequacy and low self-esteem or become swayed

INAPPROPRIATE SONG LYRICS

ikTok lets users lip-sync to their favourite songs and produc their own music videos. Some of the music choices contain swear words or sexual themes. So not only can children be exposed to potentially inappropriate content but they can broadcast themselves miming or singing these lyrics.

CONCERNING CONTENT

Some of the outfits and dance moves in videos can be overtly sexual and provocative. There have also been reports of some users sharing concerning content, such as videos that promote anorexia, porn, self-harm and violence.

DANGEROUS TRENDS & CHALLENGES
On TikTok, there are always 'trending challenges' and hashtags that users can copy or build upon, and sometimes, these challenges can pose risks to young people.

STRANGERS CAN FOLLOW YOUR CHILDREN

If your child's profile is open, strangers can use the app to comment on your child's videos. While this isn't always sinister, it gives potential predators the ability to contact your child through the platform.

IN-APP PURCHASES

Of course, as with many apps, there's a paid element to TikTok. Users can buy virtual coins to be exchanged for virtual gifts – for example, if they like a specific video, your child can use coins to purchase emojis to show approval. These can be expensive and easily purchased – there is the option to buy 10,000 coins for 297.99 with a one-click buy

ANYONE CAN SEE YOUR CHILD'S CREATIONS

TikTok encourages users to 'share their passion and creative expression through their videos' and while something may seem fun at the time, videos can get in the wrong hands and cause embarrassment in the future. If posted publicly, anyone in the world can see your child's homemade music video and potentially cause bullying within personal friendship groups or even online



Tips parents

TALK ABOUT THE PITFALLS OF OVERSHARING
Encourage your kids to always think before they do, say, like or post anything online, explaining that their digital footprint' can shape their online reputation and the way that other people see them. Something they may find funny and entertaining now may impact them in the future. Talk about how to deal with peer pressure and how doing something they think will impress others could affect them.

HANDLING CRITICISM

While it's fantastic to see your child being creative and expressive and bonding with people with similar interests, they need to be aware that not everyone will be supportive online. Comments can be negative or even cruel. Make sure they know how to comment respectfully and handle negative feedback. In the app's Privacy and Safety settings, your child can decide who can react to their videos, who can comment, and who can send them private chat messages. We suggest using these settings so only their friends can interact with their posts.

SIGNING UP WITH THE CORRECT AGE

When signing up to TikTok, you are prompted to input your birth date. If your child inputs their age as under 13; the app will not allow them to sign up and will be locked for 24 hours. The app is intended for users aged 13+, so explain that the rating is there for a reason; to keep them protected from online dangers, It is actually possible to watch TikTok videos without even creating an account, so it's important to check if your underage child has downloaded the app to their devices.

USE THE 'DIGITAL WELL BEING' SETTING

If you're concerned about the amount of time your child is spending on TikTok, in the app's setting, you can switch on a feature called Digital Wellbeing. This includes' Screen Management' to limit the amount of time your child spends on the app.

SET THE ACCOUNT TO PRIVATE
This means that only people who you and your child approve of can see their creations. To make an account private, tap the three dots at the top right of the screen to access settings. Click 'Privacy and Safety'. Scroll down until you find 'Private Account' and turn this setting on.

REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

If you or your child see something on TikTok that appears to be inappropriate, they can report content in different ways within the app. They can report an account, video, comment or chat conversation by simply tapping 'Report'. In the app's 'Digital Wellbeing' feature, there is also an 'Enhanced Restricted Mode', which limits the appearance of videos that may not be appropriate for all audiences.

AVOID IDENTIFIABLE OBJECTS
To ensure that there's no way of anyone tracking your child's location or identity, make it clear to them that they should never film a video in their school uniform or near a landmark that gives away where they live.

DISCUSS IN-APP PURCHASES

DISCUSS IN-APP PURCHASES
To lower the risk of your child making accidental in-app
purchases, teach them exactly what in-app purchases are and
the risks of making them without permission. Tell them that
they are not essential to enjoy the app and that if they want to
make a purchase, they should always ask you beforehand. In
the app's 'Digital Wellbeing' feature, there is the option to
disable the function of purchasing coins and sending gifts.



This week Jessica Benrejdal tells us about her Personal Enrichment



Enforcing this motto, Year 12 have been given the opportunity to take part in 'personal enrichment', where spend our Wednesday 5th period to take part in a session of our choice. This includes; social justice, ceramics, and mindful colouring.


Alongside our personal enrichment, we have community enrichment – where we have the opportunity to give back to the community around us. This includes; PR and marketing (helping to write articles for the Holy Family newsletter) and Silver Surfers. Any way to better the community matters.

In this article, the main focus will be on film club, led by Ms Orblin, as earlier this week, the film chosen struck an interesting chord in me as a viewer.

The film we watched was called 'Untouchable' (English translation being 'The Intouchables'), a French comedy-drama film which came out in 2012, about a black

man out on parole for robbery, who applies for the job of a paralysed man's caregiver in order to get a signature for his application for unemployed benefits. He is rejected at first, but he is given the job eventually. The film focuses on their growing relationship, regardless of their obvious differences. The film has an underlying truth of how there are more jobs for a caregiver then helping the person to wash and eat; but to provide companionship.

For me, watching that film, made me feel content as the protagonist started to see how happy his life could be as he started to grow a friendship with the paralysed man (Philipe), who made him forget about his worries. As we were introduced to the protagonist, we saw the hardships and empathised with the character and as we saw him becoming more accepting of his caregiving role, we empathised with him and soon accepted them as likable characters.

Overall, I found the film really inspiring as there were underlying messages they were trying to portray, including race and prejudice, in a way that may not have been as obvious to the audience as, in my opinion, this may not have been the only message the director was trying to put out. I believe that the message may have that anyone can be given opportunities and it is up to them whether they should take it on or not, but not doing so may be an experience missed out on. I think this award winning French film exemplifies the meaning of friendship and how much it can mean to someone.

In any community and in our case, Holy Family, in times of struggles, friendship is something that should be strong and treasured and having any opportunity to make a new one sounds pretty amazing.

Thank you for reading this article. This film really did mean something to me and hopefully this article resonates with you too.





imagining who lived here and how ancient it is. Continuous analysis of the furnishings and decorations, judging everything in it. However, today was a different experience... I wandered cautiously into the abandoned catastrophe, a deserted existence that gave a vacant stare into my soul. A dingy atmosphere full of broken walls, broken paintwork and broken dreams. I had never witnessed a room so disconcerting and spine – tingling, which undoubtedly contrasted the captivating and vivid atmosphere I had just left. The homely environment I had just departed from became a gloomy climate which engulfed me in murky and unsettling thoughts. For a moment, I wished to be back in the comfortable and pleasant room where I was surrounded by never-ending love and tenderness. Neglected wallpaper peeled its way off the weathered walls as they became tattered and tarnished and had darkened to a charcoal grey. It was obvious that it had endured a long life without inhabitants or contentment. It was once a busy and radiant place where prestigious sophisticated dinners where held, a crammed claustrophobic and crowded confinement where royals had gathered to greet influential guests. The mahogany table had rusted down to a fraction of the grandness it once held. Before, the table had dominated the room, whereas now it has been disregarded and neglected.

Cobwebs hang off the walls, their owners nowhere to be seen. Withered plants crept their way through the corroded window frames as if they were uninvited intruders. Sharp shards of shattered stained glass sat silently on the ground. I felt so alone, so minuscule in this empty excursion. As I stared into barrenness and desolation, my thoughts focused on the eerie ghosts that still haunted the solitary room. Black Mirror showcases a varied collection of work, which explores a range of collective contemporary and cultural themes. The title alludes to the idea of 'black comedy' and satire, with many of the artists having used humour to explore dark subject matter linked to modern-day politics and society. The exhibition offers a breadth of media and materials to explore, as well as concepts and content. Themes observed within the exhibition include identity, social media, political history, propaganda, idolatry and iconography. From small in size to epic in scale, the variety of work in this exhibition shows how different materials can be used to address diverse ideas, sometimes in the most unusual and provocative of ways. It will likewise offer students from all disciplines of Art and Design an opportunity to engage with a variety of different processes relevant to their own methods of making.








ST STEPHEN'S HOUSE CHARITY By Chloe Luz 9S


This year, St Stephen's House Charity is Mind; they are a mental health charity in England and Wales. Founded in 1946 as the National Association for Mental Health (NAMH). Mind offers information and advice to people with mental health problems and lobbies government and local authorities on their behalf. Mind provides advice and support to empower anyone experiencing a mental health problem; they campaign to improve services, raise awareness and promote understanding. They won't give up until everyone experiencing a mental health problem gets support and respect.



Mind empower people to understand their condition and the choices available to them. Their Infoline offers callers confidential help for the price of a local call; their Legal Line which provides information on mental health related law to the public, service users, family members/carers, mental health professionals and mental health advocates. Mind's award-winning publications and website, now certified by the Information Standard.

The money donated help Mind send essential information booklets about mental health to 40 people, this is acted upon with the help of just £10. The amount of £40 donated could pay for 28 people to campaign on our behalf; £70 can keep their online community Elefriends, open and safe for two hours. The money donated could offer a lifeline to eight people in desperate need of support from Mind's legal line with the help of £120; £300 can support a young person bereaved by suicide to access £1 and group support. £200 could help them keep the Mind info line open for 1 hour helping 35 people. If some people donated money that would all add up to £550, it would provide five people struggling with their mental health a place in a 10-week wellbeing group with team sports and cookery.

7S have already held a bake sale which altogether raised £70. However, there are many more activities to come. We are aiming to raise £500 altogether this year so that we can show how much we

Skipping Breakfast could stunt your growth

- Vitamin A Is necessary for proper eye and immune system development and plays an essential role in skin and cell health
- B vitamins Are involved in the health of most bodily systems
- Vitamin C is needed for bone, gum, tooth and blood vessel development
- Vitamin D is necessary for proper calcium absorption
- Calcium one of the most important minerals for growth during the teenage years because it is essential for bone and tooth development
- Potassium involved in the nervous system and muscle function, which can influence growth
- Iron a lack of iron can cause iron-deficiency anemia, a condition that impairs the ability of red blood cells to transport oxygen around the body. This can cause fatigue, weakness, shortness of breath and stunted growth.
