Did you know that 76% of statistics are false? No? Don't worry it's a made up number to a question that is not possible to answer. We live in a world where the quotation about statistics and this example are, sadly, more relevant than ever.

School funding, Brexit and the PM power struggle

I don't make a party political point here
- I'm not a member of any political
party. However, our political discourse
seems to be increasingly descending
into lies, untruths and fake news and it
is profoundly disturbing. One of the
things we must teach our young people
is how to discern truth from lies and
how to judge arguments based on
evidence.

We see this in terms of school funding. Put simply, there is not enough money to run the school as we would wish and there hasn't been for some time. An 8% cut in real terms over recent years means we have about £700k less than we would have had without the cuts. The consequence of this funding cut is that:

- We have had to make cuts to our sixth form curriculum
- We can't provide all the learning mentoring support we would like to
- We can't provide as many learning resources and upgraded ICT as we would like
- Our teachers and support staff are picking up the strain

The government says there is more money in education than ever before and at one level this is correct. However, there are many more children in school than ever before so the amount provided per student has fallen. In addition, many of our costs have increased, particularly the cost of paying pension contributions and employers' national insurance. Most ministers in this government with children send them to private schools. That is their choice. Private school fees are of the order of £15-18K per year. We get about £6k per student and apparently that's enough. Feel free to do the math as they say. The example of Jesus teaches us to tell the truth and that 'by your deeds will you be known' (Matthew 7:20). We need to be able to differentiate between what our politicians say and what they do and teaching our students to question what they are told, what they read and what they see on social media is really important. Here endeth the lesson.

Refugee Week 2019 - You, me and those who came before #Generations

This Refugee Week we are invited to discover the experiences of displacement that are found in our families, neighbourhoods and history. The theme is an invitation to explore the lives of refugees – and those who welcomed them – throughout the generations.

People escaping war and persecution have been welcomed by communities in the UK for hundreds of years and their stories and contributions are all around us. From the Jewish refugees of the 1930s to people fleeing Vietnam in the 1970s, Kosovans in the 1990s to those arriving today; they are part of who we all are.

The Justice & Peace group and Peace club both looked at the history of migration in our own families, some moving here to the UK, others who have moved overseas. It was lovely that the young people were able to share their family histories going back several generations.

We also prayed for those people seeking refuge and safety in our world today.

The Feast Day of St Richard of Chichester was on Sunday 16 June.


St Richard (1197-1253) was born in Droitwich (Worchestershire) to a landowning, farming family and studied in Oxford. On the death of his father he returned home, but soon left to pursue his calling from God and returned to Oxford, where he became the earliest Doctor of Canon Law.

Richard was appointed Bishop Elect for Chichester and served as Bishop from 1244-1253. His hospitality, teaching and patience won him the hearts of all who knew him and the apparent miracles performed by Richard set him apart from all other clergy. One miracle tells that Richard, celebrating Mass, dropped the chalice containing the consecrated wine. Amazingly, none was spilled.

Although he died on 3rd April, as this date is usually during Lent, his Feast Day

is celebrated on 16th June.
