HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Faith, hope and love

Last week at Mass the second reading was from 1 Corinthians 13, a very well known piece that is often one of the readings chosen for the liturgy at wedding ceremonies. The final verse reads: "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

We are called as Christians to try to remember this and to witness to faith, hope and love in our lives and in all that we do. These values underpin our work at Holy Family and they are the values we seek to instil in all our young people, supporting the work you do as parents/careers.

What we mean by the curriculum

The curriculum at Holy Family encompasses all the skills, knowledge and values that we believe are important to teach and pass on to our students. It includes all that takes place in the school, in timetabled lessons, assemblies, talks and activities and also all the opportunities that take place outside the formal timetable and which we call extra-curricular learning. 'Apps' are designed to run on certain devices and are written for a specific operating system, such as Apple iOS, Windows, or Android. The official store for the Apple iOS operating system is known as the 'App Store' and it's where you can browse and download more than 2 million apps and games to use on the iPad, iPhone, iPod Touch and other Apple devices. When your children are using the app store, you need to be aware of the risks...



What parents need to know about tore

LOOKALIKE APPS



Some apps and games have content that is unsuitable for younger children – even the most popular or innocuous ooking apps may feature adult-themed content, violence or cruelty to other people or animals, unmoderated chat, pornographic or sexual content.

THIRD-PARTY APP STORES Because the official Apple App Store has a very stringent policy about what apps it approves, children may look elsewhere for apps and games they 've heard about from friends. As well as the Apple App Store for iOS, there are hundreds of other third-party app stores, but the danger is they may not apply the same level of scrutiny toward the apps they allow to be listed. There's a higher chance of apps that infect devices with malicious codes or put user privacy at risk by extracting sensitive information.



To download and buy apps from the App Store, your child will need an Apple ID. If they have used other Apple services, such as iCloud, they can sign into the App Store with the same Apple ID. If they are aged 13 and under, they cannot sign up for an Apple ID on their own, but an adult can create an Apple ID for a child.

IN-APP PURCHASES Apps are either free, paid-for or free with in-app purchases. In-app purchases are optional transactions that can unlock extra functionality, virtual goods or unique content. Unless you change the settings, once your child has entered a password to make an in-app purchase, they can make additional purchases for 15 minutes without re-entering a password. This makes it extremely easy for children to accidentally run up huge bills.

LOOKALIKE APPS Some developers release apps that copy the functionality, user interface and even product names and branding of popular apps, in an attempt to trick unsuspecting users to install them. By downloading an app from an unknown developer, your child could find their device compromised. Experts warn that through app permissions, hackers can potentially take photos using the camera and access media remotely, track your child's location, record any passwords they enter for other accounts, and send text messages from phones. Top Tips for Parents

CREATE YOUR CHILD'S ACCOUNT

CREATE YOUR CHILD'S ACCOUNT You can create an Apple ID for a child under 13 and add them to your family group to keep an eye on their activity. Go to Settings > [your name]> Family Sharing > Add Family Member > Create a Child Account > Next. Enter your child's birthday and tap Next. Review the Parent Privacy Disclosure and tap Agree. With Family Sharing, you can add up to six family members to share App Store purchases, as well as ITunes and Apple Books.

SWITCH ON 'ASK TO BUY'

Switch ON ASK TO BUY If you have a child that is over 13 years of age and has their own Apple account, make sure that you only allow them to make purchases with gift cards. You can also activate the 'Ask to Buy' feature if you are using Family Sharing, so that whenever a family member who isn't an adult initiates a new purchase, a request goes to the account organiser. You can also limit what content your child can access on the devices they use.

RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASES

You can restrict your child's ability to make in-app purchases. On an iOS device, open Settings, tap General and then Restrictions. Tap 'Enable Restrictions' You can put a limitation that requires a password every time there is a purchase made in the App Store or iTunes Store.

BROWSE APPS BY AGE To find apps and games that are right for your children, check the age ratings. On an iPhone or iPod Touch, this can be found in the information section on an app's product page, and on an iPad or desktop, the age range is near the Buy button. On the Kids page, you can find apps for age ranges, including 5 and under, 6 to 8, and 9 to 11.

AVOID OTHER APP STORES Put a rule in place that your child can only use the official App Store to download apps and games. Explain why it is wise to only install applications from a trusted source to ensure their device is not affected by security issues or virus attacks.

HOW TO KNOW AN APP IS SAFE TO INSTALL Advise your child that just because they're downloading an app from an official store, it doesn't make it safe. Fake or copycat apps will often include misspelt words and poor grammar, so always read the app description, and double check the developer name and title for warning signs. Be wary of apps that come with a long list of permission requests. Check the app's reviews and ratings - one star, one line reviews complaining that an app didn't work on a certain device, or that there was a billing issue, is not a good indication.

SPOT FAKE REVIEWS When checking the customer reviews within the app store, make sure they aren't vague and generic, or overly effusive, as some developers will try to manipulate their apps' positions by posting fake ratings and reviews. Check the number of downloads the app daims to have – the higher the number, the more likely it is to be safe. Your child can also check on a company's website to see if the app is available on there.

Who or what inspired you at school?

I then studied for my PGCE teaching qualification at The University of Sheffield before attending UCL to complete my SENDCO qualification. *Have you always been a teacher?*

I was in the Army Reserve for 3 years while studying at University. In France, we have an army police force. I completed an army training for a month during the summer holidays. We learnt how to march, use all sorts of firearms and had combat training. I hated the khaki uniform... When I qualified, I was deployed in various roles such as operating on drug raids, taking inmates to/from the prison to be judged as well as escorting political figures and assuring their protection during meetings. It was an amazing experience and I learnt really important skills such as discipline, hardwork and dedication..

Why did you want to become a teacher?

I absolutely love my role as the school SENDCO and I wouldn't do anything else! The job is extremely rewarding and I feel that I am able to make a difference with students on a daily basis. I work with amazing students and I consider them all like my own children.

If you hadn't become a teacher

what other career would have interested you? I would have loved to be a language interpreter at the European Parliament or a travel journalist. What has been your most embarrassing moment in school?

I attended a medical training with the school nurse and nearly fainted during a practical in front of 30 teachers. My head was spinning and I thought that I was going to be sick. I am very squeamish! Miss Barry took me outside to get some fresh air and Mr Murphy walked past and asked what had happened. I never felt so embarrassed! Needless to say that I will never become a nurse...

What three words would your students use to describe you?

Caring, patient and a good listener (well I hope!) What would be your desert island book/song/ film?

I cannot survive without Netflix - Favourite series would be House of Cards and Game of Thrones.

Tell us something about yourself that most people wouldn't know?

My family tree is very diverse. I have French, Polish, Dutch and German origins. Getting through passport control at airports is a nightmare because I am a French citizen living in the UK, with a Russian first name and a German surname.

What would you be on University Challenge or Strictly Come Dancing?

University challenge - I am a rubbish dancer! What's the best thing about working at Holy Family?

Staff - I think we are very lucky to have such supportive and caring people in our school.







Last week students from year 10 and the Sixth Form were given the opportunity to attend a workshop on the Law Commission and Hate Crime Review hosted by local Labour MP Stella Creasy. We were given the chance to work with a wide variety of citizens within the constituency/area ranging from diverse cultures, abilities and ages to come together and discuss the current aspects of Hate Crime and safety along with possible resolutions to aid these issues with our personal input. It was interesting to listen to people of the older generation and what their perspectives were on the negative traits of the local society as well as hearing their comments towards our own opinions as the younger generation. Ms Creasy began with a starter activity with everyone having to stand in the middle of the hall if a certain scenario or situation has ever occurred to any of us individually personally, this made me feel safe and secure within myself because of the amount of people who stood up for the same reasons, giving a sense that I wasn't alone along with the other students who took part that evening.





As the evening progressed, we were then given the task to write out our interpretations of the definitions of discriminating words and how they are used in the appropriate manner and the inappropriate manner as well. Towards the end of the evening, we were put into various groups of, again, different ages, races, and abilities to brainstorm our thoughts on different questions that Ms Creasy wanted our responses to. The questions included: 'Where can hatred occur?' And 'How can we make further reforms towards the current forms of help given to the people of Walthamstow?'.







This workshop allowed us to establish our thoughts and knowledge as well as enabling us to contribute as members of our generation and local area of how Hate Crime should be dealt with and to also be educated upon the consequences of the continuous use of hatred within school, work and the world around us. We were also able to form mature ideas and sensible responses towards the current Law Commission and were hopeful in impressing Ms Creasy and her team with them. As students, we were lucky enough to make a stand for our generation and to wish for more safety within the world around us.



The Show Racism the Red Card (SRtRC) School Competition is free to enter, open to young people of all ages and abilities and is a great follow-on activity to educational work about racism. We want to encourage participants to think about racism and produce their own work about this serious issue. Young people are welcome to produce work in any medium - artwork, creative writing, song and film. If it's about racism, we want to see it!

Each year, the entries received by Show Racism the Red Card highlight both the standard of young people's own work and how the competition is an inspirational way of spreading a positive anti-racism message.
