Yr 8 and the curriculum

The curriculum is the term for everything that is studied, how it is taught and how it is assessed. The tradition in schools in England has been that students experience a broad range of subjects at Key Stage 3 before choosing their option choices for GCSE in Yr 9. Three years ago we decided to trial choosing options in Yr 8 to allow more time to prepare for the more content heavy new GCSEs. Having evaluated this programme there are pros and cons to it and as a result we are making some changes. The current Yr 8 will not choose their options this academic year. Their Yr 9 will become a transitional year, enabling them to begin GCSE work in some subjects, while continuing with the broad KS3 curriculum and having longer to decide what subjects they are best suited to choosing for GCSEs. PSD/Enrichment Day

Students enjoyed a different day on Tuesday when normal lessons were suspended and they had the chance to do different activities. Some highlights included the employment opportunities careers event for Yr 8 when around 15 employers and professions were represented. 




Guide our steps in the way of peace.


Open our eyes and our hearts, and give us the courage to say:

SIXTH FORM BEING EDUCATED ON 'SAFE DRIVE AND STAY ALIVE'

Years 12 and 13 were given the opportunity to attend a borough presentation on driving safely and the consequences to road collision.

The presentation was led by members of our local **London Emergency Services** - with each of them having witnessed extreme incidents throughout their time in service or have personally experienced and are affected permanently by situations like these.

There were many accounts as well as a visual representation delivered, of young people of similar age to our sixth formers, who have tragically gone through serious incidents consequencing in deaths or life-changing illnesses due to certain factors such as: speeding, drinking, use of drugs, being distracted by phones and the simplest form of not wearing a seatbelt. This gave an insight on how serious the result of a road collision can be and left the students thinking about their future actions when they gain the privilege to drive.

The personal accounts established by members of the Emergency Services allowed for the students to picture a snippet of what had happened during those real-life incidents being described. Despite the severity of the graphic details spoken out, this gave the students a mature and sensible thought process - sympathising with the individuals speaking whilst being aware throughout.

This also gave us the chance to be grateful for the lives that we have alongside giving so much gratitude to all members of **The London Fire Brigade, London Ambulance Services** and the **UK Police Forces** for all their dedication, time and bravery - especially through witnessing traumatic scenes whilst on duty to putting in the hard work towards the investigations made. We also pray for families and individuals who have lost their lives or have had permanent changes to their lives as a result of these accidents.



The Programme

We work with Cilex Law School and The City Law School at City, University of London, to deliver the Solicitor Apprenticeship Programme. As a Solicitor Apprentice you will work in our offices based in London. Four days a week will be spent working in our practice groups and one day will be allocated to study. On Tuesday the 14th of January, Year 8 got a golden opportunity to take part in the annual Career day. During the excitement filled day I got to interview 22 different people with different occupations and find out more about their jobs. This was highly informative due to Year 8 picking their GCSE options in the next academic year. Accountant, Recruiter, Professor at a University/Medical DNA doctor, Crane operator, Engineer, Politics, Facility manager, Biomedical Science administrator, Artist, Executive coach/Head of global sells technology, London fire brigade, Barrister, Regeneration manager, London fire brigade/former Holy Family Student, Microbiologist doctor, Advert designer, Bioinformatics, Economist, Law, Helicopter Pilot/air ambulance, HR/human resources, Financial market.

The accountant shared with me that he started off wanting to be a doctor then later figured that it was not the best path for him. He then further disclosed that the favourite part of his job is being able to support people. If you are interested in mathematics and figures then accountancy is the one for you. James earns £80,000 per year!

A recruiter is a person who recruits/ hires people for jobs. For example they would be given a criteria from their boss and would have to interview people following that criteria and try to find the individual best fit for that job. You do not need a degree for this job.

The Professor at a University/Medical DNA doctor who studied biology for her GCSE's tries to engage with all of her students. She earns a decent salary that could be increased but states she cares more about helping students that earning more money.

The Crane operator is working on a huge build to enlarge a sewer in England. It needs to be enlarged as the current sewer is too small for London's population of nine million. She informed me that she studied English Literature before but didn't like it so when she saw this opportunity she decided to change path and go for it. That was definitely the right move as she is now earning £8,000 per week due to her occupation being very high risk.

I had the pleasure to meet a former Holy Family student who is now a firefighter working for LFB. The former student revealed that he met his wife in Holy Family which I thought was heartwarming. I asked him if Holy Family encouraged him with his job. He said no but his wife is very academic so she did. The job of a firefighter is very physical and puts a lot of pressure on the workers. He ended by saying he loves his job and doesn't see himself leaving anytime.

I have learnt a lot from this experience and from these inspiring people, although I did not get to meet a Freelance Journalist which is what I aspire to be I will use what I learnt and keep on writing articles!
