HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Quotation of the week

"Nothing is so strong as gentleness, nothing so gentle as real strength" St Francis de Sales.

We sometimes hear people described as 'gentle giants'. Those who are strong often have no need to prove this to others. When we talk about strength we are not simply thinking of physical strength. Strength comes in many forms as does gentleness. During this season of Lent we can show our strength in the acts of kindness and gentleness that we show towards others.

Did you know?

On May 7th 2020, London will choose who should be Mayor of London for the next four years. Many of our Yr 13 students will have turned 18 and so be old enough to vote. The London Mayor is elected by Supplementary Vote which means that we all get the chance to choose our first and second preference. All the first preferences are counted and then all but the top two candidates are eliminated. The second preferences of the eliminated candidates are then added to the votes cast for the top two candidates, which means the winner has a majority of all the votes cast. In 2016, Sadiq Khan was elected comfortably by 57% to 43% in the final run off.

This year there are 7 main candidates - Sadiq Khan (Labour), Shaun Bailey (Conservative), Siobhan Benita (Lib Dem), Sian Berry (Green), Mandu Reid (Women's Equality Party) and Rory Stewart (Independent).

Corona-virus update

As you would expect, the school is keeping a close eye on the coronavirus situation and will follow the advice we are given by the government. Some of the steps that we have taken thus far include:

- Provision of hand sanitisers in all classrooms
- Additional cleaning of door handles, light switches etc
- Advice to students and staff about hand-washing and how to protect oneself against this and other viruses
- A close check on any students and staff with any underlying health conditions that might make them more vulnerable
- Making contingency preparations in case of staff absence or school closure and ensuring, in particular that exam preparation goes ahead and is not subject to disruption



The latest digital trend growing in popularity for our children are apps on their phone or tablet that look like one thing but are secretly hiding another purpose. They first became particularly popular in 2016. However, children are becoming more and more familiar with 'secret' photo hiding apps, where an app which looks relatively ordinary is actually a hidden gateway to private photos and videos. These apps allow their users to hide images, videos and notes within the app which is also passcode protected. One of the most common types of hidden app used is a 'fake calculator' app however many others are also available.

What parents need to know about

MAY HIDE 'SEXTING'

The most common use for the apps is to hide 'sexting' images which young people may be sending or receiving. This problem is growing rapidly amongst students, and from an increasingly early age. Not only is sexting dangerous, but it is illegal when it involves a minor even if both the sender and receiver are underage. By storing and sending these images, young people should be aware that they are committing a crime.

ENCOURAGE IMPULSIVE BEHAVIOUR

Young people tend to act more impulsively if they believe that their behaviour will go unnoticed and remain secret, so often they will produce content for these apps thinking that it will be safe. Let's face it, how many adults read all the small print in the terms and conditions, so why would we expect our children to.





PRIVACY RISK

If you are aware that your children are using the app, you should read the small-print in the usage policy/terms and conditions to ensure the developers do not have access to any of the images stored on the device. If the photos are linked to a cloud storage, then the images stored are also in danger of being released if the application is compromised/hacked.

BYPASS PARENTAL CONTROLS

Although these apps are not specifically 'targeting' their advertisements towards children, they can generally be used by anyone over the age of 4. This means that these apps will not be blocked automatically by parental controls. Whilst online platforms, such as Apple, have removed these apps on numerous occasions from their app store, due to their popularity and potential profitability for creators, they continue to be produced and find their way into the stores or available for download.



FAKE/DECOY PASSWORDS

Some of the most secure apps that are available offer the ability to set-up a decoy feature as an added layer of security. This allows the user to provide a fake password which, when used, directs people to a decoy folder containing content of the user's choice or just stock photos. The real password provides access to the secret folder within the app.





Safety Tips For Parents





TRY TO REMAIN VIGILANT

There is a natural human instinct to believe that what we see on screen is real and accurate. If you are concerned that your child might be using secret apps, you may want to look at their phone. The search feature on a device can be used to type keywords such as 'secret,' hidden' and 'photo vault'. On IOS, this can be done by swiping down on the home screen to open a search bar. If the app appears and says 'Open' then the app is installed. If it says 'Get' then it is not installed. On an andmid device, you can not to the apps menu and use the search but at the torthe screen.

QUESTION THE AUTHENTICITY OF DUPLICATE APPS

You should be aware that almost every mobile device will have pre-installed apps, such as notes and calculator, so the first major warning sign would be to look for duplicates of these apps. By default, the pre-installed apps are almost always displayed not the first page of the home screen.







Examples of Hidden

DISCUSS THE DANGERS OF 'SEXTING'

Ensure your child is aware of the dangers of sexting, and how it is illegal to keep or distribute images of minors. Try to talk to your children in a positive way a nd encourage them to take control of their online persona and what they are posting to others. Remind them that they always have a choice and that they can say no to anything that makes them feel even the slightest hit uncomfortable.



LOOK OUT FOR IN-BUILT 'HIDDEN' FEATURES

iPhones have the option to lock notes within the default Notes app. Users can paste images into a note file and lock it using Touch/Face ID and a password. In addition, IOS allows their users to move images to a Hidden folder in the photos app. When an image is moved to the hidden folder, it is removed from the 'All Photos' folder. To find this folder, open the 'Photos' app, scroll down and click 'Hidden' Users may also create folders to try and hide the app on their home screen or on a second

CONTROL APP USAGE

your child's IOS device is linked to your Apple ID account, you are able to set a password for downloading apps which only you know. This will ean every-time your child tries to download an app, they will need your password to do so. If you do not have access to your child's Apple ID, you an delete the app without a passcode. This will delete any images stored on the app and will not be recoverable, even if the app is redownloaded



We would like to thank Walthamstow School For Girls for hosting the challenge day.




Last week we celebrated World Book Day!

many new books recently added to the





As well as being interviewed, we watched our peers in our group being interviewed, and had to later give them feedback, commenting on their responses and overall performance. We were asked questions such as why we are a good fit for the job, what we know about the company we're applying for (M&S), how our past experience has impacted our skill set, and were were also given typical scenarios we'd meet on the job, and had to answer how we'd overcome these challenges effectively. Once finished with our interviews, one person was chosen for the job in each group!!

To end the day off, we were given the opportunity to network with all the interviewers, who had professions from a wide range of sectors including law, architecture, marketing, teaching, and many more!! Lastly, a talk was given by a speaker from Leicester University, outlining the opportunities and courses offered by universities across the country; we were given insightful information about the range of courses, and how they can lead to numerous pathways in life.

Overall, the day enabled the entire year group to gain useful experience of getting into the professional world, giving us tips and advice for all interviews and applications in the future - it was a really insightful day for us all.




The day culminated with every team showing off their Listening and Presenting skills by giving presentations to explain why their offers were the best, in a bid to outdo their competitors.



What is Pi?


Pi (π) is the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter.
