Black History Month

October is Black History Month and the history department is leading the way with thought-provoking resources and materials to generate discussion and reflection. Assemblies are being held on Black History and we are also hosting discussion groups and opportunities to reflect on the contribution of black people to the history of the UK and of the world.

The Pupil Leadership Team

Our pupil leaders met as a group this week to hear about the Year of Sustainability initiative which we are marking at Holy Family for 2019-2020. The students have many ideas about how the school can improve its recycling, use of energy, litter and food waste among other things. This summer we have had low energy lighting installed, we have better insulation and thermostatic control of our heating systems and we are actively seeking to reduce the amount of paper we use. It is the students who will lead this work and we are confident they will help us to make a positive difference.

Growing our own

Some of our students, Jakub and Hubert in Yr 10, in particular, have been working with Mr Mansell to develop raised beds in which we can begin to grow our own vegetables. They have been constructing the raised beds and filling them with soil and compost before they will plant seeds. Last week at Mass we heard that 'the harvest is rich, but the labourers are few'. We have our own labourers in our student gardeners at Holy Family and we look forward to them creating a rich harvest in the work they are doing in our Holy Family vegetable patch.





PROJECT PROJECT POLAND

On Friday, 25th October our Year 8 students will be participating in an event called Project Poland. This is a very exciting event and forms part of the Polish centenary celebrations. The project exists so that school children in the UK can get to know more about Poland, Polish people in the UK and our shared stories. Students discover diversity in Polish history and learn about the concept of migration and understand more about causation. The project promotes the importance of social cohesion and tolerance and the students will acquire an appreciation of a different culture. Students will be actively engaged and there is the possibility of being invited to the reception at the Polish embassy on 5th February 2020.

Here are some interesting facts:

- Bonds have been forged between the two countries since the 15th century
- Polish people fought alongside the British to defeat fascism in WW2
- Many Poles settled in the UK immediately after the War
- Since Poland joined the EU in 2004 thousands of Poles have emigrated to the UK
- Polish people are now the UK's largest foreign-born community.
- 2018 was the 100th anniversary of Poland regaining its independence.

FUTURE MAKERS

Jenatie Ganesharajah and Stacy D'Souza feature in Forbes

Last summer, Mr Hussain took a group of our Computing students along to a programme called FutureMakers which teaches young people how they can use Artificial Intelligence (AI) and were tasked with the mission of how they can use AI to solve social problems that matter to them.Two of our year 8 students Jenatie Ganesharajah and Stacy D'Souza came up with an object recognition software seeking to catalogue marine life, to contribute to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 14.They designed a public catalogue of marine species using image recognition. This allows people to photograph fish and other underwater species, upload the images to a website, then label and store them in the catalogue. They can earn points to donate food to people who are most dependent on the ocean. If they don't

know what a species it is, the smart image recognition system will suggest some options. They also wrote a poem about the journey of a plastic bag in the ocean which was beautifully articulated.



The Story of Neil Kenlock

The 1960s and 70s were a turbulent time for black Britons, police brutality and government racism had created an uncomfortable living space for people who had seen Britain as their home and their hope for a better life.



link between capitalism and racism.

Neil Kenlock (**pictured left**) was one of many children who had come over to live with his parents after they had arrived as part of the Windrush generation. He arrived from Jamaica thinking he had reached the promised land, what met him was very different.

Kenlock instantly noticed his difference, living in Brixton he was appalled when he saw the state of his housing. In his teenage years he was refused entry to a club in Streatham despite the fact he was wearing his suit. It was this callous racist incident that led him to the British Black Panthers.

The US movement was one that promoted violence and radical ideas, the british movement was slightly different. As Kenlock says it was about "education" and making the

Kenlock felt if he could document the experiences of black people in Britain he would educate people about the lived experience of racism. His focus was demonstrating the strength and power in the community: often his images focused on the vibrancy of the carribbean community celebrating the cultures of black british people.

However he also documented the horrifying racism that plagued Britain in what was supposed to be the "swinging sixties". While the Beatles were taking over America, black britons were in a struggle with the British government for recognition of their plight "One of the most shocking photographs I've taken was of George Berry, who was the first black pub owner in Brixton. He spent a fortune reinventing his pub and then he left and went home. The following morning, it was totally burned out."


