HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Quotation of the week

'Double, double, toil and trouble;. Fire burn, and cauldron bubble', William Shakespeare, Macbeth

Halloween falls next week during half-term and the 31st October was also supposed to be Brexit Day. That doesn't seem to be the case, but the feeling now seems to be that we will still be in the European Union when we return to school on Monday 4th November.

A month of remembrance

We shall then find ourselves in the month of November, a time of remembrance for all of us. We remember our family members who have died and we celebrate our whole school Mass of Remembrance on Thursday 7th November in the Waltham Forest Assembly Rooms. Students will be dismissed from there at approximately 3.10pm. I say approximately because we can't be entirely sure how long the Mass will last.

First class

Congratulations to former student Brandon Quirin who recently graduated with a first class degree in software engineering from Brunel University. Our expectations of behaviour Our expectations of behaviour are very high and we are there to correct and guide students. What we are not there for is to be constantly questioned by some of our students as to why they are being pulled up for breaches of the behaviour code. It is hugely wearing for the staff. It is very tiring to always be asked why? Toddlers and young children do this with their questions and it is not easy to keep patience with them. Teenagers often want to answer back and this needs to change. We are not here to constantly be questioned about what the students are told. We are in loco parentis meaning in place of parents when your children are at school and in the same way that noone's family runs as a democracy neither does school. It is exceptionally tiresome to be constantly questioned about what should be commonly understood expectations.

For example: we don't allow ear-rings and nail varnish. If you come to school wearing nail varnish you will be told to remove it. You are inviting an unnecessary confrontation. We don't expect to have to be questioned and explain why nail varnish is not permitted when it should be commonly understood.

HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

A second example, you are expected to take your hood off in the building. Why? Well, because it is a school rule and the reason we have it as a school rule is twofold. First, that it is not possible to identify students if they have hoods on and second, because the commonly understood expectations in society are that when we are indoors we don't wear hoods and hats inside a building.

Rudeness from a student in response to such points of correction can cause such incidents to escalate and can lead to students saying things which they later regret.

As I'm sure everyone appreciates, teaching can be a very difficult job. Teaching teenagers can be very challenging. Parenting just one teenager can be very difficult. We often teach classes of 30 who all want their individual needs to be met. It's very difficult and we ask for your support in talking to your sons/daughters about not answering back and doing the right thing.

We will be taking a hard line on students answering back when we return to school after the break and I ask for your support and understanding with this.

Parents' surgery

Parents' surgery is every Thursday from 4pm to 5pm on the Walthamstow site. For those new to the school, parents' surgery presents an opportunity to see me, as the headteacher, without an appointment about any concerns that you may have. If ever I am unavailable, a member of the senior team substitutes for me.

Please continue to remember us in your prayers.

Enjoy the week off and we return to school at the usual time on Monday 4th November.










Students' comments: "On Thursday 10th October our Year 13 French class attended sessions on the topic of World War Two at the French Institute in South Kensington. The first session focused on France and their involvement in the war but this was only a brief introduction to what we then discovered about France from the library books which we were instructed to browse through for more information. After that, we were tested on what we had learned from our research through an online quiz. The final activity of the day was watching the French movie 'Au revoir les enfants', based on a story from World War Two, which showed war from children's perspectives and their view on Jewish people as well as the French society's view on Jews.

My trip to the 'Institut Francais' in South Kensington was a very educational trip for me as I have been able to learn about the history of France during the Second World War and I have also been able to use the French library for extra research for my Independent Research Project for my French A level course.





THE FUTURE OF TECHNOLOGY

This week I was invited to participate in a very prestigious AI talk hosted by Mozilla at the Royal Society of Arts in London. I was selected as I had previously worked with them at their annual technology festival. Me and my group were the only children invited, which made it quite scary. If you didn't know, AI stands for Artificial Intelligence and is a machine capable of learning from it's experiences and thus theoretically thinking for itself. Primitive forms of this already exist in algorithms used by Google, Facebook and Alexa.

After the main talk we split into groups, watching tech demos and forming discussions. We hypothesised which jobs were in danger of being done by unpaid robots, such as self driving taxis and automatic surgical equipment. A discussion that came up was a debate whether or not robots could be used as judge and jury rolled into one. People suggested that a hackable system of law is unwise, whilst the opposition counters that the people who can hack an AI are a far smaller group than those who can threaten and bribe a Jury.



So, the question arose of are we in danger of growing up in a world where the job market is flooded by androids which can do a job faster and better than a human? We debated this at length and came to the conclusion that while it's inevitable some jobs will be automated, there are certain, more creative jobs- like artists and writersnot to mention jobs that can't be entrusted to robots, like MP's or police officers that are safe, at least for the foreseeable future.

Overall I learned these things and more at this amazing expo. I believe we should not fear AI, but embrace it. Sure, it will cause some pretty major changes but the potential is insane. The software could process ten billion more times information every second than any human, solve problems we have speculated about for centuries and overall eventually run at such a rate human knowledge will double every 12 seconds! A change is coming, and we should be ready for it!

On Monday 21st October, 8S delivered an assembly on Unsung Heroes. They spoke about many people who have made an impact but who may not have been rewarded for their efforts. Some of these Unsung Heroes included mathematician Alan Turing, NASA scientist Katherine Johnson and activist Malala Yousafzai. In addition to celebrating these figures, students wanted to celebrate the Unsung Heroes of year 8 but needed help to find them. They asked students and tutors of Year 8 to nominate someone who went above and beyond to help others, and received over one seventy nominations!

The verse from John's Gospel "Love one another as I have loved you" was displayed as students entered the hall, giving students an opportunity to centre on Christ and reflect, as they gathered that all Love comes from God. This was then the focus of our student led final Prayer.

Unsung Heroes

85' Class Assembly

Dr Megan Coffee

In 2010, Haiti was struck by a massive earthquake, which destroyed more than 250,000 homes. Dr Megan Coffee, an American expert in infectious diseases, set off to Haiti to help. She knew that some diseases would spread quickly in a place where people were having to live without clean water or proper shelter. Coffee didn't have a hospital, so she set up a tent where people could come for treatment and advice. Six years later, she's still in Haiti. She gave up her job, which was at a top university back in the United States, and she now does not receive a salary. Since she arrived, however, she has saved thousands of lives.



Alan Turing

Alan Turing was an English mathematician. During WW2, he had a huge impact on breaking the German Enigma code, leading to Allied victory over Nazi Germany. The extent of Alan Turing's work did not fully come to life until after his death. His code-breaking operations at Bletchley Park are credited with shortening the war by as much as two years - saving countless lives in the process.

Malala Yousafzai

Malala Yousafzai, is a Pakistani activist who, while a teenager, spoke out publicly and defended the education of girls and that should be allowed they ar education. She gained global attention when she survived an assassination attempt at age 15. In 2014 Malala was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in recognition of her efforts on behalf of children's riahts.

Katherine Johnson

Katherine Johnson is a mathematician, physicist, and a scientist for NASA. She could be considered a genius, as she graduated from school at the age of fourteen and from college at the age of eighteen At the age of twenty, she was one of the first three black women to attend the graduate school at West Virginia University. Later, she would go on to ork at NASA, where she was one of the pionee n STEM calculations. She plotted multiple flight courses for NASA, including the course of the Apollo 11 spacecraft, which is famous for having een the first spaceship to reach the moo

Irena Sendler

Irena Sendler, who was a social worker in Warsaw, Poland, during the Second World War, is thought to have saved at least 2,500 Jewish children from being sent to the Nazi prison camps. Sendler found ways of getting the children away to safety. In 1943 she was caught by the Nazi soldiers, but would not tel the Nazis the names of the children she had saved or the people who had helped them She was sentenced to death, but escaped and began her work again, using a differen name

William Wilberforce

William Wilberforce was an MP who worked for the abolition of the British slave trade. Wilberforce was a deeply religious man and later became an Evangelical Christian. He was a popular figure and was known to be charming and witty and a great public speaker. He campaigned for a number of causes: for legislation to improve the lives of the poor; education; prison reforms; ending child labour; and he was one of the founders of the Royal Society of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.


