Covid update

As you know following the government's decision to go to a 3rd national lockdown, we have moved to remote learning for all students except vulnerable and key worker children, who may still attend school, for at least the rest of this half-term. This week we have had between 30 and 35 students attending school each day. Thanks to staff who have come in and supervised and supported them.

Remote learning

In terms of remote learning you can expect that there will be a high proportion of 'live' lessons and we are following the school timetable as best we can. We have circulated a code of conduct to everyone setting out the ground rules and expectations for taking part in lessons. We record everyone's attendance at each lesson and follow up if students are absent or appear to not be participating well. Please try to help us in this - one thing we can try to do as parents/carers is to encourage our children to get up, get dressed, eat breakfast and treat the school day as a working day. We will be sending out a parental questionnaire at the end of next week to ask you for feedback about your experiences of remote learning.

Pastoral support

Pastoral support continues and your son/daughter's year team will be communicating with you and following up any issues that arise. We are calling home where we have concerns or to offer support and we will be expanding our KIT (Keeping in Touch) calls next week as we did during the summer lockdown so that we try to personally contact everyone fortnightly if possible.

Digital devices

We have supplied quite a number of devices to families this week and are looking at what we can do to help with broadband issues and with data for mobile phones. This issue has moved up the national agenda recently too which is good to see. If you have any issues with digital access to remote learning please let us know - you can contact me or any other member of staff about this. My details are supplied again at the bottom of the newsletter this week.

Exams GCSEs and A levels update

The Secretary of State for Education announced that GCSE and A level exams are cancelled this summer and that grades will be awarded based on teacher assessment of the progress and performance of students in Yrs 11 and 13. This is likely to be a similar process to that used last summer and we are told there will be support and training for teachers. We are awaiting this and as soon as I know more I shall let you know. For the moment it is vitally important that every student continues to engage with their lessons, completes any assignments set and completes all tasks as their teachers require them to. We will be making assessment decisions based on all the evidence and data at our disposal.

Amended Risk Assessment

The Borough has asked us to make some further amendments to the school's risk assessment. This includes requiring everyone attending school at present to wear a face mask at all times except when eating or drinking. In addition, everyone is asked to bring at least **two masks per day** because there is evidence that the effectiveness of face covering diminishes over time and an individual mask should not be worn all day. The amended risk assessment can be seen on the school website here.

Mass Testing

You may have heard about the planning for mass testing using Lateral Flow Tests (LFTs) that schools have been working on this week. We are piloting our testing on staff who are present in school today, Friday 8th Jan. LFTs provide a result in 30 minutes and are useful for discovering where there may be asymptomatic cases of covid within the school population. Our plan is to offer this weekly to students who are attending school at present subject to parental consent and we hope to offer this from next week. Further details will follow.

Parents' surgery

Parents' surgery is currently a remote service. If you would like to speak to me please contact the office on either site and they will let me know that you would like me to call you on Thursday afternoon between 4pm and 5pm. 

Feast of the Epiphany



The Feast of the Epiphany was live streamed on Wednesday 6 January, at 12.15pm from St Edward the Confessor in Romford. It was be celebrated by Fr Dominic a

The Epiphany celebrates both the Magi (three kings or wise men) visit to Jesus shortly after his birth and also Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist.

According to the Gospel of Matthew, the three wise men - named Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar - followed the star of Bethlehem across the desert to meet the baby Jesus, offering gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The three Kings represented Europe, Arabia and Africa respectively. The gifts were symbolic of the importance of Jesus' birth, the gold representing his royal standing; frankincense his divine birth; and myrrh his mortality. In many countries the day is a public holiday. In the Spanish speaking world, Epiphany is known as Dia de los Reyes (Three Kings' Day). In Mexico, crowds gather to taste the Rosca de Reyes - Kings' bread. In other countries, a Jesus figurine is hidden in the bread.


What happens if I break the rules?


GEOGRAPHY

C.A.D. - COMPUTER AIDED DESIGN


Computer aided design is the use of computers to aid (help) in the creation (making), modification (changes) or analysis of a design.



REMOTE EDUCATION 10 TOP TIPS FOR PARENTS

Remote education ensures continuous learning outside the classroom. For parents and carers, remote education isn't always straightforward and there can be a number of factors they need to consider, especially around ensuring their children feel comfortable and are familiar with the whole concept. That's why we've created this guide to help parents and carers support their child in getting the most out of their remote education experience.

1. TAKE AN ACTIVE INTEREST IN YOUR CHILD'S LEARNING

As a parent or carer, your school may have explained how remote education works already, but children may still need help. Take an active interest in their learning and help support them whenever they need a helping hand.



2. MONITOR YOUR CHILD'S COMMUNICATION AND ONLINE ACTIVITY

It's important to remind your child that despite being at home, the same level of behaviour and conduct exists as if they were at school. Encourage them to remain polite, remember their manners and not to post or send any negative comments just because they are behind a computer.



3. ESTABLISH A DAILY SCHEDULE AND ROUTINE

07:30 Working from home and trying to learn in a more casual setting that children might associate more with play and a degree of freedom might take a bit of getting used to. Try to stick to a daily routine and use the timetable/schedule that schools have sent home to help children keep on top of their daily learning.



Remote learning will inevitably require more interaction with computers, laptops and tablets. Teachers will invariably advise on screen breaks; however, it doesn't hurt to keep a check on their time online or encourage them to get some fresh air/exercise.



5. ENSURE YOUR LEARNING DEVICE IS IN PUBLIC SPACE IN THE HOME

It's important to consider where your PC or laptop is placed if live video is being used. Try to keep the background neutral, with no personal ation visible and move learning devices out of the bedroom as this could be deemed inappropriate.



6. IMPLEMENT SAFETY CONTROLS AND PRIVACY RESTRICTIONS ON APPS AND SOFTWARE

Dependant on how your school implements remote education, your child may be required to download certain software or apps. Whilst these are likely to be relatively safe to use, like any other new app or platform, parents should still implement safety controls as a precaution.



7. ENSURE YOUR CHILD ONLY USES OFFICIAL SCHOOL COMMUNICATION CHANNELS

It's important that all communication with teachers and school staff is directed through approved school channels, whether that be through the school's online portal or the relevant secure messaging site.



8. FAMILIARISE YOURSELF WITH RELEVANT SCHOOL POLICIES

Schools should have a policy on remote education that they can share with parents. Familiarise yourself with this and ensure you know what is expected of teachers and your child during lessons, both online and



9. MAINTAIN FEEDBACK WITH TEACHERS

Engage in communication with teachers where possible, and try to feed back progress and development as well as any helpful suggestions around the learning process. Be transparent but remain professional and only use official channels to communicate.



10. MONITOR YOUR CHILD'S WELLBEING AND MENTAL HEALTH

Remote education will likely mean that your child won't get the same level of social interaction and might not see their friends for a while. Keep a check on their wellbeing and try to encourage them to get out as much as they can. Whilst learning from home might seem fun and exciting to start to with, missing out on seeing their friends every day might take its toll.
