Fair Trade Fortnight

This week has been the first week of Fairtrade Fortnight, which highlights the growing challenges that climate change brings to farmers and workers in the communities Fairtrade works with. Farmers and workers in countries such as Kenya, Ethiopia and Honduras, say climate change is one of their biggest challenges right now and low prices for their crops mean that they are struggling to fight back.

The climate crisis is an immediate and everincreasing threat and those in climate vulnerable countries are already seeing its impacts from droughts and crop disease to floods, heatwaves and shrinking harvests.

Fairtrade gives shoppers the opportunity to live and shop according to their principles and take action to support farmers and their families. Fairtrade provides consumers with an opportunity to connect with the people who grow the produce we enjoy and need.

Our assemblies this week were on the theme of fairtrade, equity and social justice all themes which fit in very well with the season of Lent, a time when we should be thinking more of others and less of ourselves and when we consider especially those who find themselves in difficult circumstances.

Collection of clothes and household items

Over the past couple of weeks staff have been bringing in items from home that they no longer want or need. These are all in good condition and we intend on making them available to families who may need some support at this time. The pandemic has meant that some families may be struggling at the moment and so we want to help. Colleagues are currently sorting out and cataloguing what has been donated and we shall be making arrangements so that we can get items to where they are needed. Please look out for further information about this, but if you are in need of such things as children's clothes, teen and adult clothing, baby items, bedding or other household items you may email me in confidence and we will make what we have available to you. Arrangements for reopening the school

As you will be aware, the government has announced that schools will reopen from Monday 8th March. Secondary schools are required to offer Lateral Flow Tests (LFTs) to all students on their return and we are then required to make these available to all students on three occasions. These tests are subject to parental consent unless a student is 16 years old or over (which includes all sixth formers and many Yr 11 students).

Lateral flow tests are carried out by the person themselves swabbing the back of their throat and their nose. They are processed in school and a result is available after only 30 minutes. The aim of the testing programme is to try to identify any student or member of staff who may be asymptomatic but actually infectious with covid19.

HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

We will be contacting all parents next week with consent forms to ask you to provide consent for your child under the age of 16. This is, of course, not obligatory, but we would like all students to be tested because that will offer us the best chance of identifying any potential asymptomatic infectious cases.

The government's plan is that, after carrying out three tests of students in school, parents will then be provided with testing kits to carry out these tests twice weekly at home. I would encourage everyone to be tested and ask parents to provide consent to do this as it will be beneficial to our whole school community.

Because secondary schools will have to carry out a very great number of tests in school we are not expected to re-open to everyone on Monday 8th March. Students in different year groups will be phased back into school during that week once their year group has been tested. We are expected to have all students back in school by Monday 15th March and we will be using the week beginning 8th March to carry out these tests.

I will provide further confirmed details for you next week in a separate letter so everyone is completely clear about the arrangements for re-opening the school.

Arrangements for assessing Yr 11 and Yr 13 students

The government today confirmed that schools will be responsible for assessing students and awarding grades for Yr 11 and Yr 13 students this summer.

Grades will be based on evidence that we have about each student's performance including performance on any mock exams, in class assessments, any coursework completed and any further assessments which the school makes use of.

Grades will be published on 10th August for A level students and 12th August for GCSE students, which is earlier than usual in August. Grades will be subject to moderation processes within the school and will be subject to external checks by exam boards. There will be an appeals process for any student unhappy with their grades. We will be working out our procedures for carrying out this important work in the coming weeks.

Grades have to be submitted by schools by 18th June 2021 and it is really important that all Yr 11 and Yr 13 students continue to work hard, complete the work set by their teachers and give the best account of themselves so that we have the best evidence base on which to make grading decisions.

Lily Parr

(26th April 1905 - 24th May 1978)

Lily Parr was born in 1905 in St Helen's, Lancashire. She was the fourth of seven children and learned to play both football and rugby from her older brothers. As a child she rejected traditional girls' pursuits, such as cooking and sewing and focused on sport..



Her size (she was 6ft), strength and lack of fear along with her athleticism, meant that by the time she was 13, she was able to hold her own in Lily's football career began in 1919, at 14 years of age when she signed for St Helen's Ladies. In her second match, when her team played against Dick, Kerr's Ladies, a factory team from Preston, she impressed the manager Alfred Frankland so much, he invited her to join his squad. As part of her signing, she was offered a job at the factory, lodgings with a teammate in Preston and 10 shillings for every game she played.

Women's football at this time was hugely popular. During the First World War, when millions of young men had been sent to the front to fight, women's football was used to boost morale, and teams played to raise large amounts of money for charities for disabled servicemen. Dick, Kerr's Ladies were one of the earliest teams and were the first team in which women played in shorts! In her first season at Dick, Kerr's Ladies, winger Lily Parr, scored 43 goals. A local newspaper wrote of her: "There is probably no greater football prodigy in the whole country. Not only has she speed and excellent ball control, but her admirable physique enables her to brush off challenges from defenders who tackle her"

Lily played against both male and female teams and she reputedly had a harder shot than any male player. A male goalkeeper once had to be stretchered off after she'd taken a penalty against him, apparently shouting "Get me to the hospital as quick as you can, she's gone and broken me flamin' arm!"

Lily also played international football and completed tours of France and the US, where she was hailed as "the most brilliant female player in the world." in the press.

Despite the FA banning women's teams from playing on affiliated pitches until 1969, Lily carried on playing football for 32 years, from 1951 at Preston Ladies, scoring over 980 goals throughout her career.

Lily eventually stopped working in the Dick, Kerr & Co. factory and trained as a nurse, working at Whittingham Hospital and Lunatic Asylum. Whilst working at the Hospital, Lily met her partner Mary, and together they bought a house in Preston. Although it was socially unacceptable to be a lesbian at the time and many lesbian couples went to great lengths to conceal their relationships, Lily and Mary refused to hide. Lily is therefore celebrated as an LGBT+ icon as well as a footballing one.

Lily died in 1978 and is buried in St Helens. She was the first woman to feature in the National Football Museum's Hall of Fame in 2002 and in 2019 a life-size statue of her was erected outside the museum.

ST DAVID'S DAY

1st March





Saint David was born in Caerfai, Wales. David's fame as a teacher and his asceticism (strict chastity) spread among Celtic Christians, and he helped found about 12 monasteries. His foundation at Glyn Rhosyn became an important Christian shrine, and the most important centre in Wales.

The date of Saint David's death is believed to be 1 March 589 AD. His final words to the community of monks were: "Brothers be ye constant. The yoke which with single mind ye have taken, bear ye to the end; and whatsoever ye have seen with me and heard, keep and fulfil." For centuries, 1 March has been a national festival. Saint David was recognised as a national patron saint in the 12th century at a peak time of Welsh resistance to the Normans. He was canonised by Pope Callixtus II in 1120.

Children in Wales take part in school concerts with recitation and singing being the main activities. The younger girls sometimes wear traditional Welsh costumes to school. This costume consists of a long woollen skirt, apron, white blouse, woollen shawl and a Welsh hat. Also, various Welsh Regiments of the British Army use aspects of Saint David's cross, Saint David himself, or songs of Saint David in their formalities during the celebrations.





Many Welsh people wear one or both of the National symbols of Wales to celebrate St. David: the daffodil (a generic Welsh symbol) or the leek (Saint David's personal symbol) on this day. The flag of Saint David often plays a central role in the celebrations and can be seen flying throughout Wales. Popular dishes traditionally eaten on Saint David's Day include cawl (soup), bara brith tea loaf, Welsh Cakes, Welsh lamb and Welsh rarebit.









What happens if I break the rules?


- Any account where inappropriate behaviour is reported or suspected will be suspended immediately.
- Parents will be contacted to discuss the inappropriate behaviour and when it will be reinstated.


