Dear parents / carers,

It's been another good week at school with very high rates of attendance (>96%) and some excellent engagement and work going on in lessons. Everyone is back into their routines now and we are settled in the school and well established in our routines. The staff are working exceptionally hard to keep all our young people safe and to educate them as effectively as possible. Year 11 have been doing their English speaking and listening assessments and there have been many excellent speeches on all manner of important topics.

As you know we were not able to hold our usual face to face Open Evening last week. However, this week we have held socially distanced minitours for a maximum of 5 parents to show them round the school if they are interested in seeing the facilities at Holy Family. We carry out these socially distanced parental tours at 4pm on Tuesdays and Thursday at the moment and they have proved very popular and are currently all fully booked up until the half-term holiday.

Our newly appointed Pupil Leadership Team (PLT) held their first meeting on Thursday of this week. It was a remote, virtual meeting with students located all over both sites of the school. 
Black History Month

October is always the month when we pay particular attention to Black History and to the contribution of Black people to the history, not just of this country, but around the world. We are doing work at departmental level on the agenda of what is sometimes called 'decolonising the curriculum' and may be thought of as 'making the curriculum more inclusive'. This year as a school we are offering extra-curricular courses discussing black history and staff are meeting regularly to look at issues relating to race and discrimination. We want to ensure that our curriculum reflects the diversity of our school community and will be carrying out a school wide audit of all our provision over the coming weeks.

Can men cry? Mental health in males

Big boys don't cry, they say. A real man doesn't crumble to tears. Why are you crying? They ask, are you a girl?

In today's society, it has become a norm that men shouldn't be able to show any emotion apart from anger as people believe it makes them less masculine and weak. I decided to choose this topic as in the past I had experienced this norm in real life. A boy was crying and his friends laughed at him and said "be a man". My heart shattered for him and to this day I regret not saying anything. Since then I felt like I was always hearing "don't cry that's gay" or "cryings for girls, boys don't cry" When did men suddenly become robots? When did being a man mean all of your tears dried up like the desert? When did being a man mean you couldn't express your emotions? Everyone has emotion, everyone can cry. Men shouldn't have to bottle up their feelings because others feel it makes them less masculine because it doesn't. If a man shows any sort of emotion it shows they are stronger than all of the rest because they have the courage and backbone to break the toxic stigma created by civilization. Do you think it's ok for boys to cry?

In a study of how humans cry and react to crying Dr Virginia Eatough found that there was psychological pressure on men that made them feel like they were unable to cry. So I decided to see how the boys I knew felt about this statement. I selected boys from the age range of 14-16 and I asked them what their opinions were on this statement. I was distinctly disheartened to find that out of the 20 boys that I had asked, 65% of the boys agreed with this appalling statement and insisted it wasn't ok for boys to cry. Some of the words the boys said included "Us boys are meant to be the provider, so if we are crying it just means that we are weak and useless" and "real boys don't cry regardless", "boys can't be very emotional, that's girly" "real men don't cry they sort out the problem or put on a brave face, that's what men do" I felt a huge amount of distress for these boys as they had to grow up believing they couldn't express themselves. Boys are often told that it is better to control their emotions and to be brave when they are going through a difficult time, they shouldn't have to hold anything back, do you really think you have a right to tell anyone how to handle their feelings? Research shows that holding back tears can have a negative effect on how much boys express themselves, and that it may lead to them trapping their feelings inside, never telling anyone how they feel rather than asking for help. A result of men constantly hiding their emotions is suicide. Suicide is the single biggest killer of men under the age of 45 which is a lot greater than women. Men are more likely to committ suicide because of a lack of communication, while women are willing to shre their problems men are less likely to admit when they feel vulnerable increasing the risk of them committing suicide.

You may not know but we all have mental health. All of us. Are you stressed about your exams? That's a sign of mental health. Do you struggle to sleep at night? That's a sign of mental health. Do you sometimes feel a bit angry? Mental health. We all suffer from mental health and it's not something to be ashamed of. Bear in mind, next time you want to laugh or put someone down that people who cry are often stronger than people who hardly shed a tear. Crying is a natural healthy emotional output and that is hardly weak.

Dear God


We thank you for everything we have and how lucky we are to have these opportunities.

ADHD is a condition where you have lots of energy and have difficulty concentrating. You might also find it hard to control what you say and do. For example, you might speak without thinking first, or find that you do things on impulse.

Symptoms usually start very early life, before the age of six. We don't know exactly what causes ADHD but experts think it might run in families, or it could be to do with the way the chemicals in your brain work. But you might start to experience ADHD-like symptoms if you've had a difficult experience.

Another condition called ADD (Attention Deficit Disorder) has similar symptoms to ADHD, but you don't feel as hyperactive. For people with ADD, the main problem they have is difficulty concentrating

What people with ADHD would like you to know?


Not everyone who has ADHD shows the same symptoms. Some people are the stereotypical bouncing off the walls and not paying attention at all. Others have high anxiety levels where worrying overcomes them. ADHD also can be very different between boys/men and girls/women.

It is difficult to remember things. It doesn't matter how many reminders I set, if I can't actively do the task right away, there is a good chance it gets forgotten.

When we lose focus or space off during conversations, it's not you or the topic. We just have a very hard time staying focused on one thing. While you are telling us something, we hear and see you, but we also are looking at the art on the walls, and then catch half of a conversation from a group over there.

If we are doing things while you are speaking, we are probably getting more information from you than if we were 100% focused on you. As weird as it sounds, I can gather a lot more information from a conversation if I am doodling, or doing something to distract my brain by doing "thoughtless" a thoughtless action, like doodling or tapping my fingers together or bouncing my legs while I sit. It gives me an easy thing to "focus" on while my ADHD tendencies focus on what you are saying.

We can control it...sometimes. But it is exhausting, and yes medication may help some people, but it's not a cure-all. We tend to be messy. That mess is organised chaos to us.

TEACHER AND NOVIEWS

Beryl Gilroy was born in British Guiana in 1924. She was a pioneering writer, teacher and part of the 'Windrush generation'.

She came to study at the University of London in 1952 as a colonial subject of the British West Indies.

Although she was a trained teacher, racial prejudice in the profession meant she initially worked as a kitchen hand in a cafe, a factory clerk and a maid.

education and her writing, the Institute of Education made her a fellow and the University of North London conferred an honorary doctorate.

Her son, Paul Gilroy, is an academic.

Despite these challenges, she refused to be seen as an outsider and used her experience as material for her creative writing. Her autobiography Black Teacher (1976), was fuelled by the need to "set the record straight".

She married an English man and had three children. People called her children 'mixed race', but she always thought it was a very strange term. In 1968, she became deputy head and then head of Beckford Primary School in Hampstead. In 1982, she joined London University's Institute of Education and the Inner London Education Authority Centre for Multicultural Education. Later, she got a doctorate in counselling psychology.

Despite being a qualified

She wrote several novels including Frangipani House (1986), set in Guyana, exploring issues of ageing. She also wrote about the history of the Caribbean and African diaspora in the period of slavery.

WINDRUSH GENERATION

Events have meant that the term Windrush generation has featured extensively in the news of late. Get your students to research the term. What was Windrush and who were the Windrush generation? Why have they been in the news? Get pupils to explore the stories of those who came to Britain on the Windrush, what caused them to come here, what life they faced when they arrived and whether it met their expectations?

JUR HISTORIES

Millions of Britons have parents from different communities and traditions. Your students will have a wide range of backgrounds. If pupils are to feel safe and have a sense of belonging, they need to engage in discussions about their cultural identities. Get them to decorate a box or fabric tile with pictures, ideas and objects that are important to them and reflect who they are. The class could also devise a poem, song or assembly that reflects their identity as pupils.

FACHING

Beryl Gilroy was a pioneering head teacher. Get your class to explore teaching. Would they like to be a teacher? What do they think is involved in the work of being a teacher? What inspires teachers to pick that job?
