I meet regularly with the colleague headteachers in the Catholic primary schools and on 1st March we will again be holding our Mass for representatives from all our schools for Yr 2 up to Yr 13. More about that occasion nearer the time.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Today is a sombre day - Holocaust Memorial Day when we prayed and remembered all the victims of genocide in the world. We've delivered assemblies and studying the Holocaust is part of the key stage three history curriculum so all students learn about the Nazi Holocaust during their early years with us. Sadly the inhumanity humans are capable of showing to one another and the systematic attempts to annihilate whole groups of people still continues and must be challenged and resisted.

Covid situation and mask wearing

We are still counting a small number of daily cases of positive covid tests among individual students, but the level of infection is moving down. We will therefore make the wearing of face masks optional in both corridors and classrooms from Monday of next week, 31st January.

University admissions

We are delighted that Tanya C., one of our Yr 13 students has been offered a place to read History at Trinity College Cambridge. Many congratulations to her. We now find that we secure places at Oxford and Cambridge every year at Holy Family and it's great that students can aspire and gain places at our leading universities. Many other students (a record breaking 131 in fact) have applied this year which is wonderful.

History masterclass

We are grateful to Mr Fidegnon's daughter, Audrey Fidegnon, who is a student of history at the University of Warwick for coming in and taking a Yr 9 history class focusing on the skills of analysing a source, which was about colonial attitudes towards the education of people in Africa. It was really inspiring to the students to have this session and to learn about studying history at university too.

Sports fixtures

We have a busy calendar of sports fixtures taking place and are enjoying considerable success, particularly in basketball. As the pandemic recedes we want to ensure that not only sports fixtures, theatre visits and trips to art galleries continue to resume but that life returns to what we knew pre-covid. The extracurricular life of the school is really important and adds so much to the experience of our students.

PSHE/RSE

We continue to deliver sessions in personal, health and social education (PSHE) and relationships and sex education (RSE) through weekly sessions in every year group. An overview of the curriculum for these subjects will be available on the website and if you have any questions we would be very happy to answer them. PSHE lessons take place weekly on Friday mornings, delivered by form tutors and Yr 9 have additional weekly sessions focused on guidance, choices and the future as well to help them prepare for their GCSE options choices.



Holocaust Memorial Day 2022 Theme vision

One Day

'You didn't think about yesterday, and tomorrow may not happen, it was only today that you had to cope with and you got through it as best you could. '

Iby Knill, survivor of the Holocaust

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) 2022 is **One Day**. There are many ways to interpret the theme, some of which are outlined here.



One Day for Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day is **One Day – 27 January –** that we put aside to come together to remember, to learn about the Holocaust, Nazi Persecution and the genocides that followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur, in the hope that there may be **One Day** in the future with no genocide. We learn more about the past, we empathise with others today, and we take action for a better future.

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One Day when life changed

Survivors of the Holocaust and of genocide often talk about the **One Day** when everything changed, sometimes for the worse and sometimes for better.

Iby Knill feels that from One Day to the next, everything changed and yet nothing had changed:

"One day Grett, my school friend-greeted me with an embrace. The next day she ran across the road and twined her head away so as not to acknowledge me."

Franziska Schwarz Mikus was sterilised by the Nazis because she was deaf, as part of their process of persecuting anyone who did not fit their ideal – in this case, because they believed that disabled people were imperfect and worthless. On that **One Day**, the Nazis took control of Franziska's body, of her life choices. The Nazis wanted to prevent people they deemed 'unfit' from being able to procreate. It has been estimated that between 1933 and 1939, 360,000 individuals were subjected to forced sterilisation, because they had physical or mental disabilities – or were perceived to have disabilities.

For Faiza, there was a defining day. Following a civil war in 2003, which has left millions of people displaced, the Sudanese government has supported Arab millila who have destroyed hundreds of villages, and murdered thousands of people. Faiza was targeted by the Sudanese Government for supporting victims of the genocide, and so, she says:

'One Day 1 decided to leave my country. It was a hard decision, but there was no other way. I left my home, my friends, my people; I left all my belongings. There is a book on a table near my bed open to page 49 waiting for me.'

One Day at a time

It may be hard to pick out just **One Day**, as for many, to keep going through each and every day was a huge struggle, with no end in sight and no glimmer of hope that the next day would be any better.

The genocide in Rwanda lasted 100 days, beginning after the plane carrying the President was shot down on 6 April 1994. The genocide followed decades of tensions between Hutus and Tutsis. **Beatha Uwazaninka** recalls how, having watched fellow Tutsis around her being murdered, and on many occasions thinking she was going to be murdered, 'every one of those hundred days was dangerouss'.

For many, one day was grindingly and dully like all the others, with no chance of improvement or change. **One Day** seemed to last for years, and 'every day of their life was a day of suffering and 'prmert' (Chil Rajchman, The Last Jew of Treblinka).

One Day in history

To mark HMD, you could pick One Day in history and learn about that day.

What happened in Warsaw on 19 April 1943? Nazi Germany had entered Poland four years earlier in 1939, and started establishing ghettos in spring 1940, to segregate, dehumanise and control the Jews. The largest of the ghettos was in Warsaw, where more than 400,000 Jews were crowded into 1.3 square miles of the city with poor sanitation, limited food and cramped conditions. It is estimated that more than 92,000 people died in the Warsaw ghetto because of the squalid conditions. On 19 April 1943, the Jewish inhabitants of the Warsaw Ghetto fought back against the Nazi Regime



Or 12 July 1995 in Bosnia? Against the backdrop of a war, after Bosnia declared independence from Yugoslavia, Bosnian Serb troops descended on the town of Srebrenica. They began separating Bosniak men from women and children despite the area having been designated by the UN as a 'safe area'. Over the next couple of days more than 8,000 Bosniak men and boys were murdered in and around Srebrenica. 12 July 1995 was the last day that many women saw their husbands, fathers, sons and brothers.

Or 17 April 1975? On this day the Khmer Rouge entered the Cambodian capital and Mardi Seng noted 'on that same bright, warm, glorious and victorious day, a new era began: not of peace and tranquillity, nor of hope and prosperity, but of suffering, torture, hunger, diseases, work camps, re-education, and systematic killing'. The arrival of the Khmer Rouge on 17 April 1975 brought five years of terror, with more than two million people murdered.

How many lives changed on each of those dates, and what happened to the people involved?

You could also choose the same date in different years and look at what was happening in different countries and different years:

27 January – what was happening in Berlin in 1941, in Cambodia in 1976, in Rwanda in 1994 in the lead up to the genocide? And 27 January 2022, what is happening around us in the world today?

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One Day in the future

Those who were targeted and persecuted held out for the **One Day** in the future when all their suffering would be over, hoping they would 'all see the day of liberation' (Elie Wiesel, *Night*).

On Holocaust Memorial Day we learn from genocide for a purpose – to build a better future. When we look ahead to 'one day with no genocide', what do we need to do today to achieve this? We can use this theme to motivate us to speak out when we see injustices, prejudices and identify-based violence.

On Holocaust Memorial Day 2022, this **One Day**, we will all come together in our communities, to learn from the Holocaust and genocides – for a better future.

One Day is a snapsh

One Day is just a snapshot in time and therefore cannot give the full picture, the context, the background that is needed, but it can help bring a piece of the full picture to life. The age or gender of the victim, or their geographical location ensured that no **One Day** during the genocide was typical. The same date would be experienced very differently by Jews hiding in France, Jews incarcerated in Auschwitz, Jews awaiting their fate in Hungary, for example. For those who suffered for days, weeks, months, years focussing on just One Day is a starting point, a way in for us to lear more about what happened during the Holocaust and the genocides that followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

On Thursday 27th January it is Holocaust Memorial Day. This is a day when people come together to remember and learn about what happened during the Holocaust.

'You didn't think about yesterday, and tomorrow may not happen, it was only today that you had to cope with and you got through it as best you could.' Iby Knill, survivor of the Holocaust

This year, the theme is One Day in the hope that one day in the future there will be no genocide.

Over the past few months, I was fortunate to be chosen to take part in The Auschwitz Project - a project where I was able to find out more about the Holocaust and listen to stories from survivors.

Before you can consider the impact of the Holocaust, it is important to consider what the Holocaust was. The Holocaust was the mass murder of approximately 6 million Jewish people by the Nazis and their collaborators during the years 1941- 45.

When the Nazis came to power in Germany in 1933, Jews were living in every country of Europe. A total of roughly nine million Jews lived in the countries that would be occupied by Germany during World War II. By the end of the war, two out of every three of these Jews would be dead, and European Jewish life



would be changed forever.

Firstly, the Nazis developed the idea of the Jewish population living in separate, concentrated areas. This idea was known as the territorial solution.

In 1939 Heydrich decreed that Polish Jews should be concentrated in towns and cities - ghettos. Here the Jewish people were stripped of their rights and property.



Once the Nazis realised that they would not have enough time to fully implement the territorial solution, they developed the final solution to the Jewish question. The idea was to use Jewish people as labour and those that couldn't work were put to death.

Finally, the Nazis decided that they could perform mass murderings of groups more effectively to annihilate them. This idea was led by collaborators and the head of the SS-Adolf Eichmann.



One of the most important parts of the Holocaust was the Nazi death and labour camps. Auschwitz-Birkenau was the largest death camp built by the Nazis in the Polish town of Oświęcim. Created as a concentration camp for Polish political prisoners in 1940, it became an extermination camp in early 1942. 1.3 million people were sent here with approximately 1.1 million being Jewish. Of these people it was believed that 960,000 people were killed. After they were tricked or forced onto deportation trains, the Jewish

people spent 5 days crammed in cattle trucks. These trains were guarded through the whole journey and anyone that tried to escape was murdered. Upon arrival the men were separated from the women and children. The methods of murder were the same in all the camps. They were sent to 'showers' which were airtight gas chambers in which poisonous gas was released.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

While it is important to remember the events of the Holocaust it is also very important to remember the testimonies of the survivors. As part of the project, I was able to hear the stories of the following survivors:

Kitty Hart-Moxon OBE

Following the German invasion of Poland, Kitty's father decided to flee eastwards to the city of Lublin. However, the city was soon occupied by the Germans and its Jewish population was subjected to rapidly

increasing persecution, culminating in the creation of a ghetto. Kitty was sent to Auschwitz-Birkenau as a laborer with her mother. They were imprisoned and sentenced to death, but their sentence was later commuted to imprisonment in Auschwitz-Birkenau. In her second year there, she was forced to work for 8 months in the Kanada Kommando, a work group that had to sort the belongings of the camp's victims. The Kanada complex where Kitty worked was situated very close to the four gas chambers and crematoria. This close proximity meant that Kitty was a witness from April 1944 to November 1944 to the relentless killing that took place. This was the period in which the greatest numbers of victims were murdered. Kitty



and her mother were the only survivors of their family. Kitty's father had been murdered; her brother killed in action at Stalingrad and 30 members of her family perished in Auschwitz-Birkenau.

Mala Tribich MBE

Mala was born Mala Helfgott in 1930 in Piotrków Trybunalski, Poland. When the Nazis invaded Poland in 1939, Mala's family fled eastwards. When they returned, Mala's family had to move into the ghetto which



was established in her hometown, the first in Poland. When the ghetto was liquidated, Mala became a slave labourer until November 1944, when the remaining Jews were deported. Mala was separated from her father and brother and was sent to the Ravensbrück concentration camp. After about 10 weeks they were transported in cattle trucks to Bergen-Belsen where conditions were appalling and Mala contracted typhus. At the time of the liberation by the British army, Mala was very ill. She was transferred to a hospital/children's home and it was many weeks before she recovered. Three months later she was sent, with a large group of children, to Sweden where she spent nearly two years. Not expecting any of her

family to be alive, Mala was surprised to receive a letter from her brother Ben in England, the only other member of her close family to have survived.

INTRODUCING THE HALO CODE

We are excited to announce that Holy Family Catholic School has adopted The Halo Code, the UK's first Black hair code.

No Black staff or students should have to change their natural or protective hairstyle in order to thrive at our school.

We hope that the Halo Code will move us one step closer to a world free from discrimination, where all Black members of our community have their identities fully recognised and celebrated.

The Code:

"Our school champions the right of staff and students to embrace all Afro-hairstyles. We acknowledge that Afro-textured hair is an important part of our Black staff and students' racial, ethnic, cultural, and religious identities, and requires specific styling for hair health and maintenance.

We welcome Afro-textured hair worn in all styles including, but not limited to, afros, locs, twists, braids, cornrows, fades, hair straightened through the application of heat or chemicals, weaves, wigs, headscarves, and wraps.

At this school, we recognise and celebrate our staff and students' identities.

We are a community built on an ethos of equality and respect where hair texture and style have no bearing on anyone's ability to succeed."





BRAILLE


On the 4th of January, the world celebrated **World Braille Day.** Braille is a tactile reading and writing system; it opens up the written word to blind and visually impaired people.

Did you know that:

- 1. Braille was developed by Louis Braille in the 1820s when he was a pupil at the Royal Institute for Blind Youth in Paris.
 - 2. Braille is not a language. It is an alphabet that can be used to write almost any language.
 - 3. Braille takes up more space than the traditional alphabet. so braille books are larger than their print counterparts. Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire is 10 volumes in braille!!

4. There's a special version of braille just for mathematics called the Nemeth Code. It was invented by Dr. Abraham Nemeth and can be used to transcribe math, algebra and calculus.

5. In recent years, toy companies have made great strides in ensuring every child has the opportunity to play some of the biggest classic family games, such as braille Uno, braille and low vision Monopoly and braille LEGO.




