## **Plans for September**

Yesterday the Secretary of State for Education announced his plans for the reopening of schools in September to all children. Detailed guidance was published which can be found on <a href="https://example.com/here.">here.</a>

I am very pleased that we will be able to have every student back in school in September and we are working hard to ensure we can do this safely. These past few months have been difficult in so many ways and for children and young people to miss out on their education has been a huge concern to us. Although staff have worked hard to provide online materials this is no substitute for face to face sessions. I am very proud of the way in which Holy Family has responded to the challenges, to the great efforts we have made to begin teaching Yr 10 and Yr 12 students in recent weeks and to the individual support and guidance we have been able to provide.

September 2020, however, will be rather different from September 2019. Although every student will, I hope, be back in school, we will have to operate differently because, as you know, COVID19 has not gone away. The government's guidance gives details of how we will need to adapt the way we work and we will be digesting this guidance and preparing our detailed plan for September over the coming days. Next week I hope to be able to share with you our updated risk assessment and give you clear guidance and expectations for the new academic year. Thank you, as ever, for your support and understanding at this time.

## **End of summer term**

The last day of lessons and the last day of provision for key worker students will be Wednesday 15th July 2020. Staff will then be able to finalise the plans for the full re-opening of the school in September and undergo necessary staff training. Families with children entitled to free school meals will receive vouchers to cover the summer holiday period. The school will not be open over the summer holiday and we will provide information about how Yr 11 and Yr 13 students are to receive their exam results in the next week or so. This may well have to be done differently this year because of the circumstances in which we find ourselves but be assured we will be there to support all students with their exam results and their choices about their future.

#### WHAT ARE SOLITARY BEES

Solitary bees are polyletic which means that they collect pollen from a wide variety of plant species. Solitary bees are different to normal bees because they are non-aggressive. They are non-aggressive because they do not have a store of honery so if you see a solitary bee just know that they are safe around children, pets and adults. Only fernale solitary bees lay eggs and they work alone collecting materials for their nest and the food for their larvae. They lay around 20-30 eggs on a large ball of sollen.

WHY DO ME NEED TO PROTECT SOLITARY BEES AND HOW DOES THIS AFFECT US ?

We need to protect solitary bees because bees are becoming extinct really fast and there are only two million bees left from 2020. This affects us because if solitary bees or any type of bees were to disappear and become extinct to the world men would only have four years left to live. We can try and help the bees by leaving bare spaces in the ground so they can catch some sushine because everyone and everything needs sunshine can if it doesn't have sunshine it is more likely to die. Even though not everyone likes bees, These particular bees will not but you and we need to come together to make a change otherwise we will not make it either.
