### Dear parents/carers

I am writing to you as I always do at the end of the summer term but this has been a summer term like no other. First of all I want to thank you for what you have done over the lockdown period in supporting your child's education. I also want to thank our staff who, I believe, have done their very best to provide excellent support and pastoral care to all of our young people over the past few months. I'm proud of how our students have responded to the challenges they have faced.

This has been a difficult and challenging period for everyone. I know some families have been especially hard hit and have suffered bereavements and periods when family members have been very ill and hospitalised. Clearly the pandemic is not over despite the easing of lockdown but it is very important that we try to get back to some degree of normality and schools have a huge part to play in that process.

I have produced this week a draft risk assessment for the full reopening of the school in September. We have learnt a lot from the process of partial reopening and approximately 90 percent of students in Yr 10 and Yr 12 have been regularly attending lessons over the last month. The students have really appreciated and benefited from this. This draft risk assessment has been discussed with our governors, our staff and our school trade union representatives. It has now been sent to the borough's Health and Safety Team who will provide feedback to us by the end of July which we shall take account of. The risk assessment will then be reviewed again in the week beginning 24th August. I shall then email the final version of the risk assessment to all parents/carers at the end of August so that you can see the measures we will be taking.

### Some key issues:

- Social distancing is no longer required for students this is because the risk
  of infection for young people is low and the risk that if infected they suffer
  badly is extremely low.
- Students will be in year group 'bubbles' and we will be keeping these 'bubbles' separate, one from the other, as far as is practical and possible.
- · One way systems will remain in place
- Every classroom will have a small pedal bin with a lid for tissues etc and students will be reminded of the importance of 'catch it, kill, it bin it'
- Additional cleaners will be deployed during the day on both sites so that door handles and other high contact surfaces can be frequently cleaned
- Hand sanitiser will be used frequently
- Students will receive clear instruction about how things must operate when they return
- · We will continue to focus on staff and student well-being and resilience
- If there is a confirmed case in school then I have to contact Public Health England and the London CoronaVirus Response Centre (LCRC) and take their advice and instructions about our response
- Our behaviour policy has been updated to reflect our new context
- Transport will be a big issue in September. We are encouraging as many staff and students as possible to walk or cycle. There will not be any access for safety reasons for parents to drive into the school car park to drop students off it is simply too dangerous.
- Students will report to different areas of the school on their arrival so that segregation is maintained
- There will be enhanced supervision rotas to ensure segregation of year groups is maintained
- The lunch period will be staggered so that only one year group at a time is using the canteen and all tables and surfaces will be cleaned between year group sittings
- The guidance states that applying the measures covered in our risk
  assessment will substantially reduce the risks of infection. The expectation
  is that the school applies these measures as far as is reasonably practical
  and where possible. This means that we cannot apply all elements of the
  risk assessment one hundred per cent of the time, but in managing to apply
  these measures to mitigate risk most of the time we will reduce the risk of
  transmission.

Unfortunately, we have to understand and accept that COVID19 has changed our world, hopefully not forever, but certainly for the short term. We are doing what we can to mitigate risk, but we cannot eliminate the risks of COVID19 from our lives any more than we can eliminate the awful possibilities that we will be seriously injured in a car crash on the way to work or that we will be diagnosed with cancer or some other life threatening illness, or that we some other catastrophic event may happen to you or your loved ones.

There comes a point where we have to balance risk and accept that there is no such thing as zero risk in any aspect of our lives. The sad reality of the NHS's effective response to COVID is that patients with other potentially life threatening conditions have not been able to be treated as speedily or as effectively as they should have been. It is estimated that there will be 50000 excess deaths from cancer because diagnosis and/or treatment was delayed. I fully understand that some groups are at greater risk than others including those with underlying health conditions and people from BAME backgrounds and we will continue to be mindful of that. The school has carried out individual risk assessments for all staff who may be at increased risk in order to make any necessary adaptations and to reassure colleagues that they will be as safe as possible in school.

### Attendance and uniform

Attendance becomes compulsory again from September for all students. We expect students to be back in full uniform from September. On days when a student has PE they are to attend school in their PE kit as we are not able to use our changing room facilities. If any parent has financial difficulty in purchasing uniform at this time please email me directly, in confidence, (a.stone@holyfamily.waltham.sch.uk) and we shall do what we can to help.

### Hair styles and jewellery

One thing that is still the same as it always is in my summer letter: Please ensure any ear piercings are done at the start of the holiday so that they are healed by the time we come back and likewise that hairstyles fit in with the school guidelines for the start of the autumn term.

The last 4 months have been a learning experience none of us predicted. It is not how I thought my working life would conclude. I hope to continue my learning in retirement, to try things that working full-time have not allowed for such as walking-in and learning about different parts of Britain. A new joy will be taking breaks and holidays

when I want them, not just in the school holidays.

Thank you to all the young people and colleagues who've made the last 28 years so interesting (challenging at times, but never boring) and the reason I kept coming back every day to the classroom.

#### Dear parent/carer

A final letter from me before the end of what has been the most challenging academic year, I suspect any of us can remember.

I'd firstly like to thank you for your patience and all you have done to support your child during these unprecedented times. You've been personal educational providers, coaches and motivators and so much more. I'd also like to personally thank all the staff in schools for the work they have done to keep schools open to vulnerable children, and the children of keyworkers, and then to additional year groups. In Waltham Forest the number of schools that have remained open and the overall pupil numbers that have been attending has been phenomenal.

As the Government has announced, it is expected that all children and young people will return to school in September. I would ask for your continued patience as all schools are using the period between now and the end of term plus much of the holiday period to plan how this will work for children.

Detailed risk assessments are being drawn up and signed off to ensure schools are as practically safe as is possible to welcome all children and young people back. Schools, with support from the Council and others are putting appropriate control measures in place and planning how they will safely group children on their return to school. It won't be schools going back to normal but rather the "new normal" where schools operate in as child focused way as possible whilst maintaining safety. Each school will communicate its plans for September as soon as it is able to and I am sure many will have already done so.

We are working with Public Heath England and other partners to make sure our local plans are effective and regularly updated.

In terms of the next academic year the Government have clearly indicated that attendance at school is compulsory. The shared belief of the Council and schools is that we very much want to support children and young people back to school. Whilst we hope and expect that most children and young people will immediately bounce back into school, we recognise that a minority will need additional support. Our collective view is that the health and wellbeing of all children is just as important as their educational outcomes, although both are clearly closely linked. Getting all children safely back

to school in September is something I am sure we will all support together and as parents you have an absolute fundamental role in this.

In terms of the curriculum in the forthcoming academic year, the Government has indicated that a full curriculum should be delivered with some scope for short term adjustments. We are encouraging our schools to fully meet this expectation whilst also supporting them in recognising the impact the last four months have had. From September in several schools you may see a "recovery curriculum" being delivered for a term or possibly slightly longer. This is to support children and young people back into effective learning. Alongside this we are also supporting schools to plan how they will mitigate the impact of any future short term need to keep groups of children and young people away from school should the need arise. We are supporting schools, where necessary, in refreshing their remote learning and access to online resources.

Limitations on availability of public transport and the pressure of all pupils returning to school is another area the Government has recognised. We are actively working with our schools to promote walking or cycling to work and would particularly urge all parents and carers that live within two miles of their child's schools to walk or cycle. There is a travel survey for parents, carers and students that we would encourage you to complete. It can be found at <a href="https://bit.ly/WFSchoolTravel2020">https://bit.ly/WFSchoolTravel2020</a> and feedback from this survey will inform our work with schools. Please look out for publicity around local schemes to support alternative means of travel to school that lessen the burden placed on public transport.

As the summer holiday begins, we acknowledge that this will bring another set of challenges for families. With this in mind we would encourage you to visit <a href="www.walthamforest.gov.uk/holidays">www.walthamforest.gov.uk/holidays</a>, which will provide information on finding childcare and things to do with your children over the next six weeks. We will be updating this regularly but also encourage you to sign up for the Councils Families newsletter and follow us on twitter (@wfcouncil) as we will be regularly sharing information on things to do, including taking part in virtual activities commissioned from local artists and organisations.

Please enjoy what I hope will be a restful summer for you and your nearest and dearest. Keep an eye out for opportunities to engage over the holiday period and look out for messages from your school or the Council regarding the start of the new academic year in September.
