Dear Parents/Carers,

STUDENTS CELEBRATE GCSE SUCCESS

Year 11 students at Holy Family Catholic School were celebrating this week following another strong set of results at GCSE.

Headteacher Mrs Laws said: "After what has been a difficult period for schools and for students, we are exceptionally proud of the hard work, commitment and resilience our students have shown in achieving these excellent results."

This year's Year 11 cohort faced the additional obstacle of a national move to return grade boundaries to pre-Covid levels, meaning that the grade boundaries for some subjects were significantly higher and the number of top grades were reduced.



Despite this, the following students achieved some exceptional results:

- Nikolas Gauba gaining eight grade 9s, one grade 8 and one grade 7
- Kezia Mathew gaining one grade 8, six grade 8s, two grade 7s
- Thomas Masterson gaining three grade 9s, four grade 8s, three grade 7s
- Patrick McCormack gaining two grade 9s, four grade 8s, two grade 7s
- Eniola Shotikare gaining two grade 9s, four grade 8s, three grade 7s
- Emilia Biedrowska gaining one grade 9, one grade 8, six grade 7s



High numbers of our Year 11 students will return to HFCS to continue their studies at our Sixth Form, HFCSIX. We congratulate all our students on their excellent outcomes and wish them luck for the start of their new courses in September. ANOTHER YEAR OF A LEVEL AND BTEC SUCCESS FOR HFCS 6TH FORM!



Many congratulations to all of our Year 13 students - we are incredibly proud of all of you!

Holy Family Sixth Form students gained their final A Level and Level 3 BTEC results today, with some fantastic outcomes representing two years of hard work. Despite tougher national grade boundaries, over a third of all A Level grades were A*, A or B grades, while the vast majority of BTEC grades were either Distinction or Distinction* grades. The percentage of students gaining AAB or higher in the traditional 'facilitating subjects' increased compared to last year and a greater number of students gained entry to Russell Group universities.



Headteacher Carolyn Laws said: 'After what has been a very challenging period for schools and for students we are exceptionally proud of the commitment and resilience our students have shown in achieving these excellent results.' Despite a national picture of grade reduction at the top end, we are delighted to have many individuals achieving outstanding results and progressing to prestigious institutions including Oxbridge and Russell group universities.



UCL Taster Day

Our sixth formers enjoyed an insightful Taster Day at UCL, where they had the opportunity to attend a Biosciences Masterclass led by a Professor specialising in Neurobiology. The day included a research discussion workshop, allowing students to explore current Biosciences research topics and discuss scientific concepts and approaches.

In addition to the academic sessions, students received a comprehensive tour of UCL science labs, gaining hands-on experience imaging transgenic lines of Drosofula fruit fly eye development and Zebrafish with state of the art confocal laser scanning microscopes and light sheet microscopy. They also had the chance to connect with current UCL undergraduate students, as well as engage in conversations with medical students and those studying Neuroscience. This enriching experience provided valuable insights into the world of Biosciences and left our students with a deeper understanding of their potential academic and career paths. Thank you so much to Professor Stephen Price @UCL Biosciences and Professor Christoper Thrasivoulou @ThrasDr for facilitating this programme, we look forward to visiting you again soon!




CAFOD Harvest Day 2023

CAFOD is an international development charity who reach out to people living in poverty with practical help, whatever their religion or culture. CAFOD is the official aid agency of the Catholic Church in England and Wales. Through their global Church network, one of the largest in the world, they have the potential to reach everyone. They campaign for global justice, so that every woman, man and child can live a full and dignified life. Their goal is to provide service in action.

Service in action

Here at Holy Family we celebrated **Harvest Fast Day** which was a **time to reflect on our duties to serve others in need.** Service is not just a word; it's a way of life. It's about **extending a helping hand to those who need it most.** Service in action means putting compassion into practice and our **biggest example is the teachings of Christ.**

CAFOD's motto is **#MakeItBright**, so on **Friday 6th October** we as a school wore our house colours and **contributed money towards serving our brothers and sisters internationally.** As a combined year group (Year 7 & Year 8), we were able to raise **£131.92** for CAFOD. This **money will be used to buy a mobile health team for remote communities across the world!**





Drop Down Day: Tuesday 17th October

Dropdown Day 1 - Health, Wellbeing & Safety - 17th October 2023

The whole school was off timetable on Tuesday 17th October for our first dropdown day of the year. Students took part in a variety of activities, workshops and talks centred around health, wellbeing & safety.

We had seven external speakers visit from three different organisations. Four delegates from TfL spoke to our year 7s, 8s, 9s and 11s about safety on public transport, how to travel responsibly and who to contact should a student encounter a problem on the TfL network. One year 9 commented that the talk was extremely interesting and he learnt loads of things he didn't know (and he hadn't expected to find the talk so interesting!). Our year 7s and 8s were also spoken to by two Metropolitan Police officers as part of the London Met's "Stop and Look Up" campaign, educating younger secondary school pupils on how to keep safe in the community and avoiding becoming victims of crime, for example putting phones away when walking down the street. Both the police officers and TfL staff commented on how inquisitive our students were, and how impressed they were by the students' behaviour across the board. One member of TfL said that we have the best year 11 cohort they have come across for a very very long time! Finally, we were delighted to welcome Alidor Gaspar, who delivered a powerful and inspirational talk to our Y9, 10 and 11 students. Alidor is a born and bred East Londoner who campaigns to raise awareness of Sickle Cell disease. He spoke openly and honestly about his experiences and how important it is that people donate blood once they're able to (when they turn 17). Alidor had an impact on many of our students who could relate to his experiences (either through having Sickle Cell themselves or witnessing the struggles of a family member), and he was kind enough to extend his time at school to give those students a small group Q & A.

In addition to the external talks, students also took part in a range of activities in the classroom. Whilst the 6th formers took part in self-defence workshops run by Streetwise, Y7s and 8s learnt key first aid skills such as DR ABC, CPR and how to treat a head injury. They had the opportunity to practise these skills on manikins and were enthusiastic in their efforts, but noted just how difficult CPR is and that it looks much easier than it actually is on TV! Our Y9s, 10s and 11s also covered some important lessons including how to stay safe at parties, spiking, the dangers associated with nitrous oxide (commonly known as "balloons"), and why both vaping and tobacco are unsuitable for teenagers' bodies.

Staff were really impressed by the engagement of students, who asked high quality questions throughout the day, took part in a variety of activities and engaged with our visitors with respect. A big well done to all the students!





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Drop Down Day: Tuesday 17th October

Sickle Cell Talk

As part of our Drop Down Enrichment Day, students had the privilege of attending a compelling talk by Alidor Gasper, the founder of the Hidden Pain Society and a dedicated advocate for sickle cell awareness. Mr. Gasper, who himself is a resilient individual grappling with sickle cell disease, shared his deeply personal journey during this enlightening session.

The aim of this talk was to foster a greater understanding of the often overlooked challenges associated with sickle cell disease. Alidor Gasper not only recounted his own experiences but also provided valuable insights into the implications of this condition. The overarching goal was to encourage awareness and empathy among the students.

One poignant aspect emphasised during the session was the vital role that communities can play in supporting individuals with sickle cell disease. Alidor Gasper passionately conveyed the significance of blood donation in aiding those affected by the condition. By sharing his story and shedding light on the importance of community involvement, he left a lasting impact on all who attended.

The talk proved to be a touching and inspirational experience for both students and staff, fostering a sense of unity and a shared commitment to making a positive difference in the lives of those affected by sickle cell disease.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

#Salutingoursisters

Every October, Black History Month is celebrated in the UK. The month provides an **opportunity to recognise and celebrate** the invaluable contributions of Black people to British society. **#SalutingOurSisters is this year's theme** and aims to **highlight the crucial role that Black women have played in shaping history, inspiring change and building communities.** The theme Saluting our Sisters **pays homage to black women who had contributions ignored, ideas appropriated, and voices silenced.**

In Psychology, we had discussions based around race and Schizophrenia (a topic we are currently studying) and assessment bias we see when it comes to the diagnostic process specifically in black people. In Health and Social Care we discussed discrimination and racial bias within the health care system - specifically wrong assumptions that black patients had higher pain tolerance compared to white patients. Both classes discussed where these racial disparities came from and ways in which we can make a change. I tasked my Psychology class with creating information slides on how we can realign stigmas surrounding black mental health, whilst my HSC students were tasked with paying homage to black women who we don't often hear about in the healthcare sector; including what they did, challenges they may have faced and #whytheymatter. 
