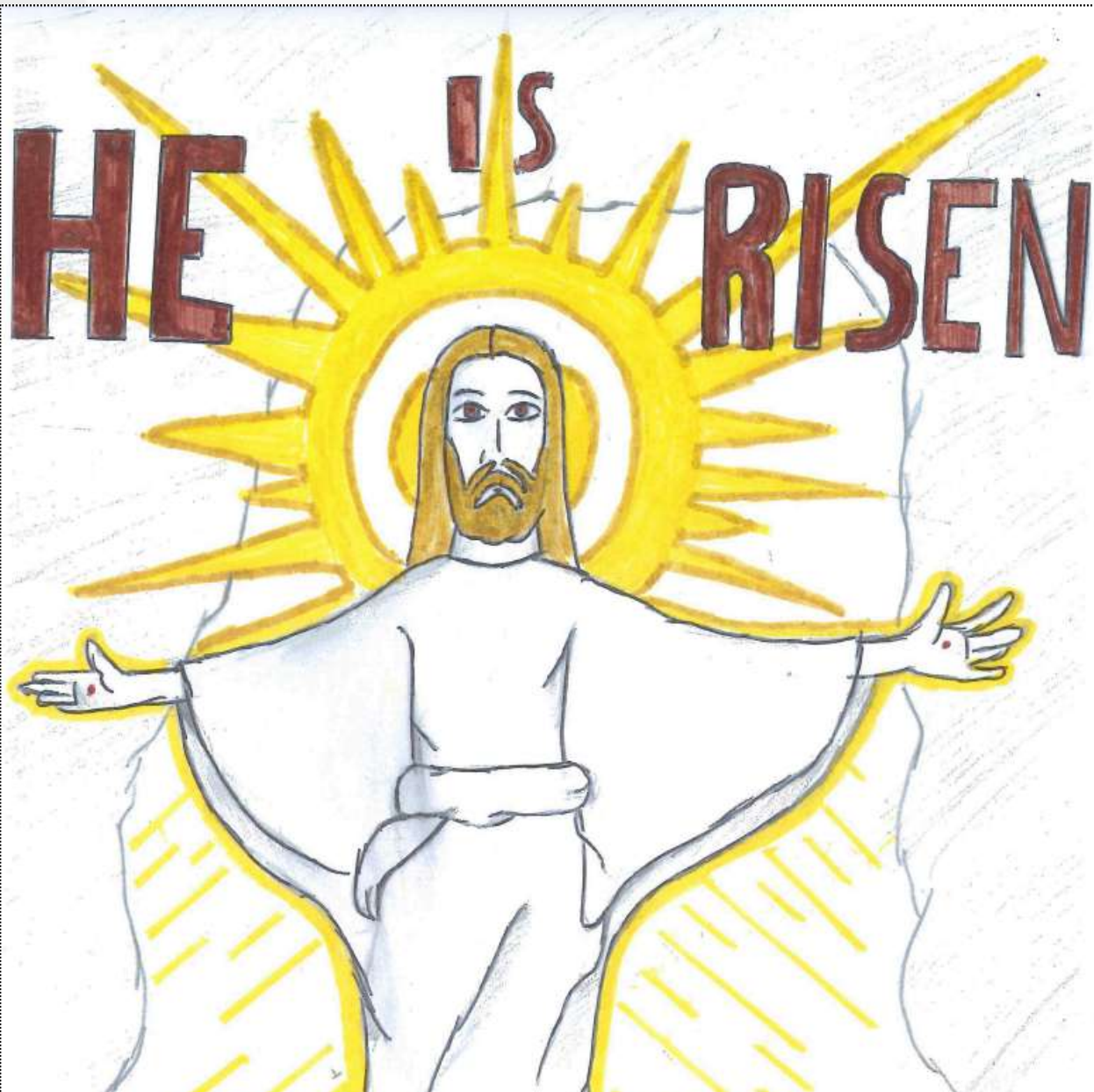

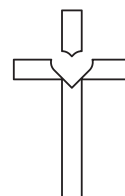
## Simple Soup Lunch for CAFOD

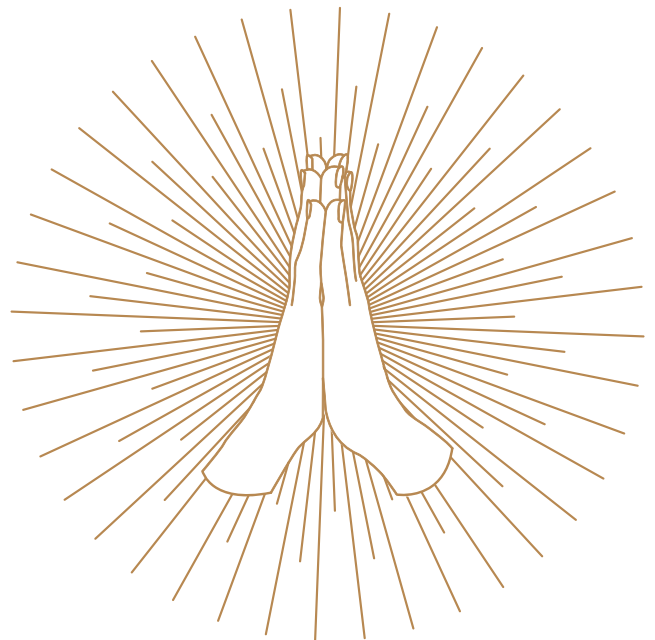
## Holy Week

Holy Week begins on Palm, or Passion, Sunday with Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem we then prayerfully reflect on the events of Jesus' passion and death. Holy Thursday celebrates the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist while Good Friday reflects on Jesus' death by crucifixion.

The Easter Vigil is the Mass celebrated on Holy Saturday and begins the Easter celebrations of Jesus' Resurrection. Beginning with a bonfire outside of the church, each person lights a candle and makes their way into church, slowly illuminating the church.

These three events are called the Triduum - three days that are the highlight of the Church year.

Holy Week is an episode in a longer story and cannot be properly understood without the story of the Resurrection - the victory of Christ over death.



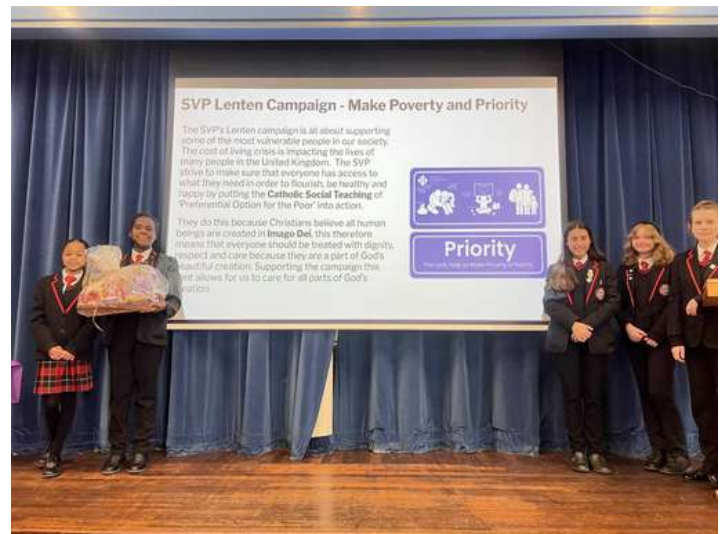

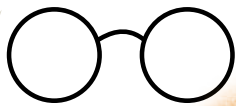


## World Book Day 2024

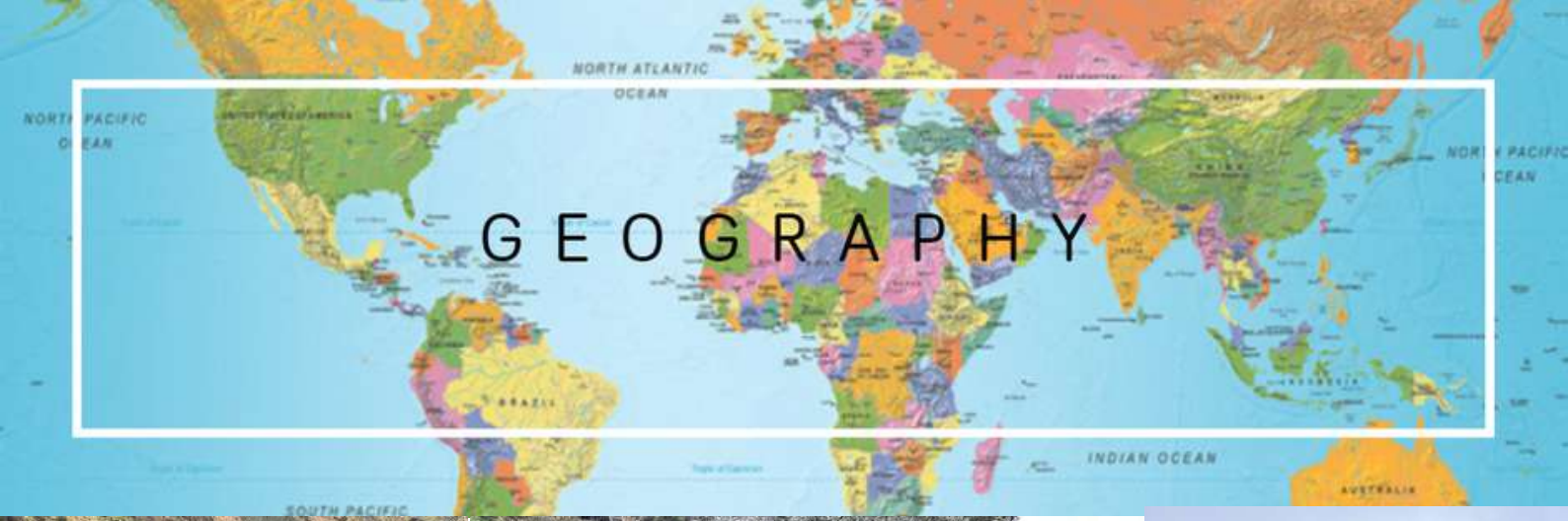
## Year 10 Geography Trip - Shropshire

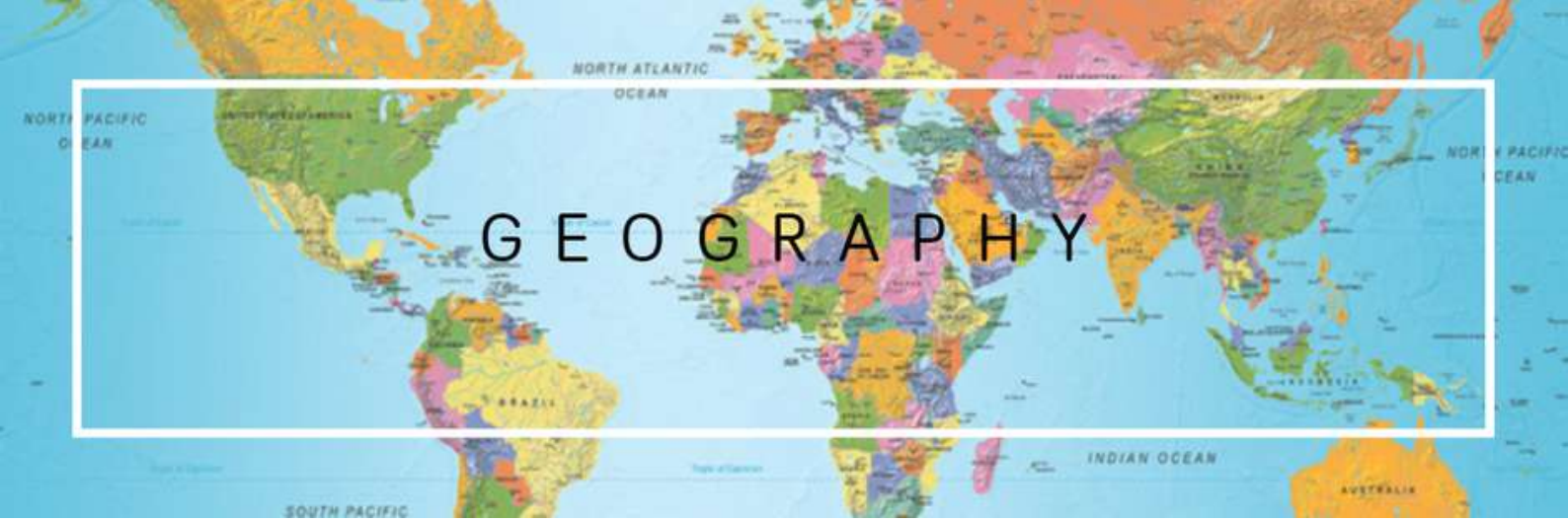

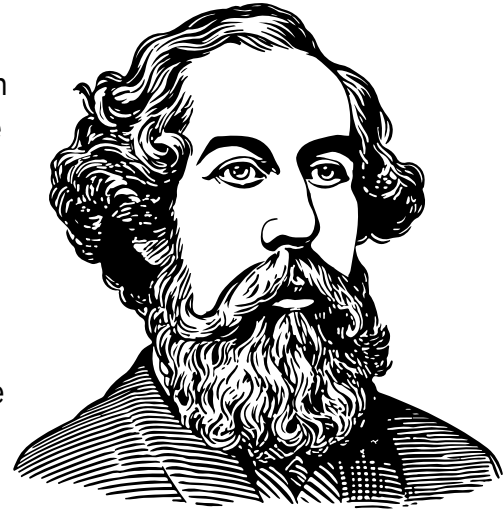
# ENGLISH

## Charles Dicken 's trip

Across Thursday 14th March and Friday 15th March, 60 Year 9 children went on the English trip to the Charles Dickens Museum and the Royal Courts of Justice to support their learning of Charles Dickens, Oliver Twist and crime and punishment in Victorian England. We were incredibly lucky to be the first ever school group to trial this workshop!

For the first workshop, students were in the Charles Dickens museum, which was Dickens' London home for a short period of time. As we moved through the different rooms and many flights of stairs, students learnt about Dickens' own life in a blacking factory after his father was sent to Marshalsea Prison for debt alongside Dickens' mother and sister, where we saw the real bars from the prison. Students also looked at some Victorian prison documents including trials of children and teenagers who had been caught stealing and a shocking document that was used to calculate the drops for hangings! Students left with a greater understanding of how Dickens' was disgusted by capital punishment and the treatment of the poor during this difficult time. But it was not all gloomy because we were lucky enough to see Dickens' study and desk where he wrote many of his famous novels including Oliver Twist!

After having lunch in nearby Lincoln's Inn Fields, we moved onto our workshop at The Royal Courts of Justice. Students participated in a mock trial in a real court room based on the case of whether Jack Dawkins (The Artful Dodger) was guilty of stealing a silver snuff box or not. It was a brilliant opportunity for students to learn about the British legal system and to gain valuable insight into careers in Law. Based on the two mock trials across the two days, we will have some excellent lawyers in the future!

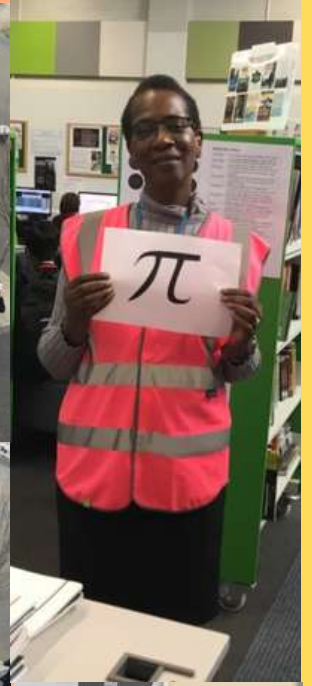

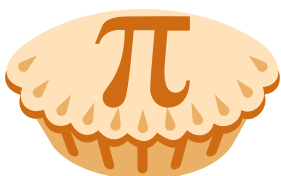

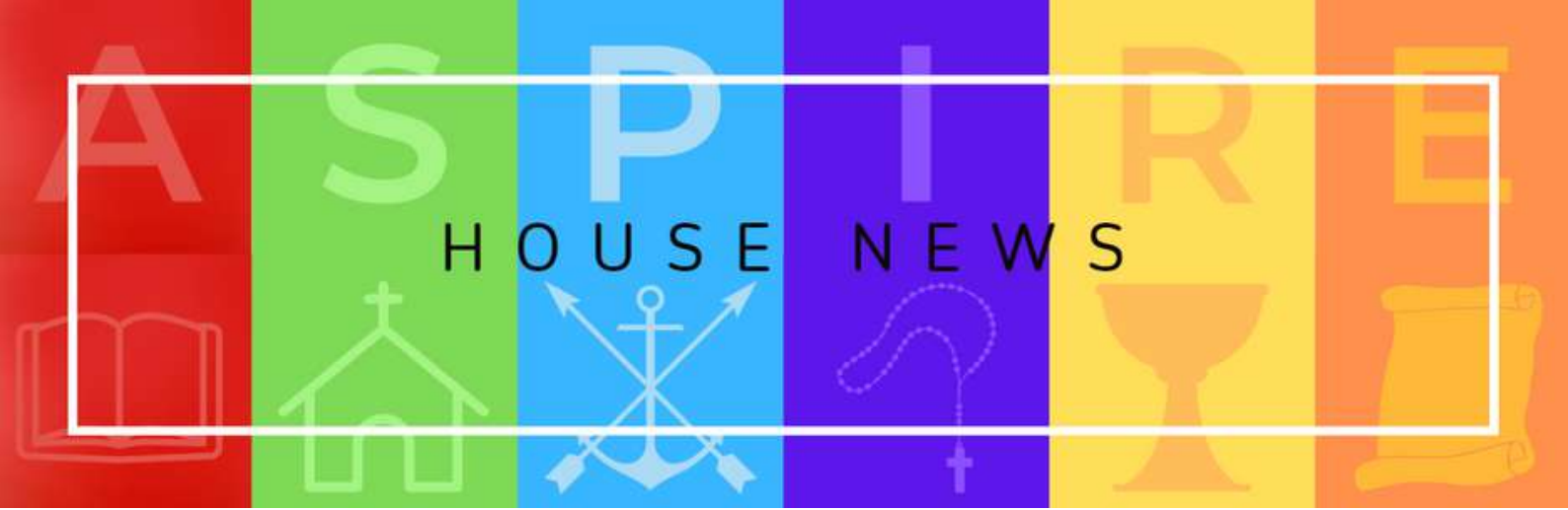
## Celebrating Excellence- Year 8 Assembly

## House Charity Competition Fortnight

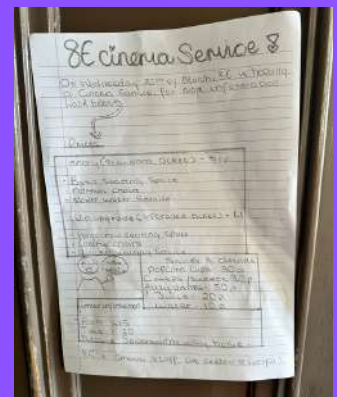

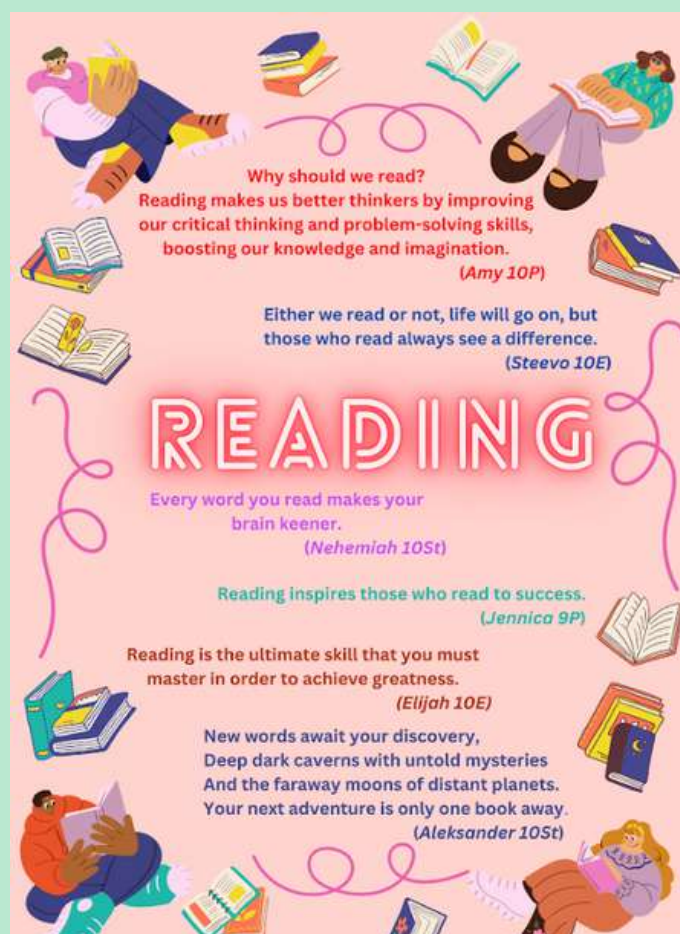


# THE LRC
