



What doe the GCSE Drama involve?



Component 1– Devising (Internally marked by your teacher) creating and performing an original piece of theatre in a group. Creating a written supporting portfolio which outlines the creative process behind your performance. Worth 40%



Component 2– Externally marked practical performance exam. Acting with Scripts. Performance of two extracts from the same play to an audience and an examiner. Worth 20%



Component 3 - Theatre Makers in Practice (Written Exam taken at the end of Year 11). This exam will be in response to a studied play - (An Inspector Calls) and a live theatre evaluation of a play you will watch at the theatre. Worth 40%


