Course Description

The BTEC Level 3 Extended Diploma in Health and Social Care is equivalent to 3 A levels, with a D*D*D* being equivalent to 3 A* A levels. The grades available for each unit are Pass, Merit or Distinction respectively. As part of the course, students will take part in a variety of activities including visits, group assignments, presentations and observations. A large amount of research work is required, Thus students are expected to utilise various resources such as textbooks, the internet, TV, newspapers, policy documents and so on. From a work experience unit, which is always a success with pupils, to a range of units covering content across the natural sciences, Psychology and Sociology, whatever your future goals, it all starts here with Health and Social Care!

GCSE Average: 3.6 GCSE grade 4 in Maths, grade 4 in English.

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Course Details:


We cover a variety of units that encompass the natural sciences, Psychology and Sociology.
