

What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is defined for the purposes of this guidance as:

- Providing **help and support** to meet the needs of children **as soon as problems emerge**;
- **Protecting** children from **maltreatment**, whether that is **within or outside the home**, including **online**;
- **Preventing** the **impairment** of children's mental and physical health or development;
- Ensuring that children **grow up** in circumstances consistent with the provision of **safe and effective care**;
- **Taking action** to enable all children to have the **best outcomes**.



What is disruption?

If a student's behaviour causes the teacher to interrupt the flow of the lesson so that the whole class ceases to be taught for a measurable period of time, the lesson has been disrupted.



Behaviours that stop teachers teaching

- Arriving late to class
- Not having the right equipment
- Not sitting in their correct seat
- Being slow to settle
- Talking whilst the teacher is talking
- Calling out
- Not having done homework



Behaviours that stop teachers teaching

- **Not following instructions**
- **Answering back or questioning the instruction**
- **Making noise to gain attention**
- **Moving around the class without permission**
- **Fidgeting or fiddling with equipment**

**Anything that holds up the important
business of teaching and learning!**



What may seem like small rule-breaking at first can have a big impact over time, especially when it keeps happening or is done by more than one student.



Research says that...

Students are potentially losing up to an hour of learning each day in schools because of 'low level disruption' in classrooms. This is equivalent to 38 days of teaching lost per year.



So,

**we will be uncompromising
in our expectations and we
will not settle for low
standards.**



Actions have consequences

No student is permitted to stop their teacher from teaching and their class from learning.

If they do, we remove them from the lesson and they will have to sit in a sixth form lesson. They will then have a 30-minute detention at the end of the school day.

This system is in place to:

- Protect the learning of every student in the room.
- Support teachers to teach without disruption.
- Make it clear that learning time is non-negotiable.



We give behaviour points when students get things wrong that we need them to get right.

If a student gets **two behaviour points in one day**, they will receive a **30-minute detention after school**.

This helps everyone understand:

- What is expected
- That choices have consequences
- That we are here to learn, every single day

We want all students to learn in a calm, respectful environment - and we'll always act to protect that.



Why?

- **Because we are incredibly aspirational for you.**
- **Because we take very seriously our responsibility to you, and to your parents, to give you every opportunity to thrive academically.**
- **Because we know that you only get one chance at this.**
- **Because we know that we only get one chance to get it right for you.**



And because of this...

We actively seek and expect the support of parents/carers in this endeavour and expect not to be challenged or undermined when our aims are so clear.



- The most creative book review will win a Westfield voucher for £25. It is due on your first day back and will be shared in your forms.


Optional additional summer task: write your very own spooky ghost story.
